## MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Dear GSA Geoscience Education Division members,

With the return of summer comes the start of fieldwork and field school education. This past June I spent two weeks teaching indigenous students in northern Saskatchewan, Canada the fundamentals of core logging, prospecting, and field mapping. This is the capstone project for students involved in the Mineral Exploration Techniques (MET) Program offered at a small regional college in La Ronge, Saskatchewan. Historically, La Ronge has been the epicenter of mineral exploration in the province, but this has changed with the evolution of provincial policy and innovative technology. To address this, the MET program was created to offer students valuable skill sets in modern geoscience exploration so they can access meaningful employment with mining and exploration projects near their home communities. This program provides northern students the opportunity to be major contributors and innovators in Canada's mineral industry without having to face the socioeconomic hurdle of leaving their small remote communities.

GSA Connects 2023, will be held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania October 15-18 (with an abstract deadline of July 25, 2023). We will be hosting an educators reception on Monday October 16, 2023 at Oliver Twist. This venue is close to the conference and will be held as a private event in the upstairs lounge. There will also be a GED table in the exhibition hall, as well as the awards luncheon. We hope this will be a great opportunity for our members to connect with each other and with the GED management board. More details on this will be forthcoming.

Thank you again for all of your continued support and membership. If there is any way that we can serve you better or if you have suggestions for the GED, such as content suggestions, please let us know (you can find our contact information on the GED website). The GED board and I are looking forward to seeing you in Pittsburgh this October!

#### **DIVISION AWARDS**

**The Biggs Earth Science Teaching Award** will be awarded to Dr. Glenn Dolphin of the University of Calgary in Calgary, Alberta, Canada. To quote his nominator, "Dr. Dolphin developed a unique and innovative approach to teaching introductory geology. [He] engages students by humanizing the science. Since the vast majority of student taking this class come from Faculty of Arts and School of Business, the use of historical narratives puts science in terms students are already familiar with, helping them realize that scientists are not just regular people, but that regular people can become scientists. As Glenn describes in his teaching philosophy, the dialogical learning process empowers students to be co-constructors of knowledge rather than the traditional transactional approach enacted in most classrooms."

The *Iris Moreno Totten Geoscience Education Research Award* will once again be chaired as a separate session at the annual meeting under Iris Moreno Totten Research in Geoscience Education session. All students and early career presenters in the session will be eligible for the award. Having a dedicated session for the Totten award has significantly improved the efficiency of judging and awarding eligible talks. If you or your students are conducting geoscience education research, consider submitting an abstract to the session. And if you are interested in serving on the award committee as a judge during the session, please reach out to the GED board. The winner of the 2022 Totten award was Stephanie Sabatini with their presentation titled "Using an aggregate skill test to assess spatial thinking in undergraduate geology courses."

#### MANAGEMENT BOARD NOMINATIONS

It is that time of year when the GED management board is seeking to fill our upcoming vacancies, and this is a great opportunity for members to get involved in the work that we do! If you would like to apply to be included on the upcoming election ballot, please submit your <u>form</u> <u>of interest</u> for one of the following positions:

- 1. SECOND VICE CHAIR will serve for one year, then rotate into the First Vice Chair position for one year, and then rotate into the Chair position for one year. The Chair will serve as Past Chair for a final year. This is a four-year commitment! The second vice chair serves as the chair of the Awards Committee, leads planning for the Educators Reception at the GSA annual meeting, and Facilitates the awarding of student travel grants. The Second Vice Chair shall assume the duties of the Chair whenever the Chair and First Vice Chair are not available.
- 2. STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE shall serve on the Iris Moreno Totten Education Research Award Committee under the direction of the Totten Committee Chair. Student reps shall represent GED on the GSA Student Advisory Council (SAC) and, to the best of their knowledge and abilities, represent the interests and concerns of GED student members to the management board.
