A Grade By Any Other Name...

Grades are a struggle. As a teacher, I have to give them. There is so much riding on a grade for a student and yet grades are not a predictor of future success. Grades are supposed to be an effective measurement of student learning. However, we often use grades as a "commodity." Instead of grades reflecting learning, they also reflect how hard a student worked and how well they have followed the rules. Examples of this come from participation grades, extra credit, and behavior points. We have all had that one student that has straight A's because they know how to work the system and that other student who is



bright and bored so their lackluster grades are no indicator of what they know. I once even had a colleague give 100 extra credit points if parents came to conferences. He always had students and parents lined outside the door desperate to see him not to discuss the students learning growth or achievement but to chase points for the grade. I want to shift this. Instead of students chasing a grade, I want them to chase learning.

This year during the AAFCS Conference And Expo Anne Etten and I presented on Standards Based Grading. My school district is halfway through this k-12 transition while Anne's district is 100% transitioned. This process albeit a challenging one, addresses many of the concerns of the traditional grading system. The traditional A, B, C, D, F grades turn into a scale of Basic, Progressing, Meeting, and Exceeding in reference to a learning target. So students leave class with a report card and a series of learning targets marked B, P, M, E instead of one singular grade for each class. Not only is this a shift in grading, this is a shift in teaching and assessment. And it seems to be the future of our current educational system. As a CTE teacher, at times this was a hard sell to me. Soft skills are a big deal to me. Showing up and on time, without your cell phone are major concerns for employers. Deadlines can cost companies millions. And yet if a Standards Based Grading only reflects learning, how will these skills be taught? I assure you they are not forgotten about but separate from the learning targets.

Diving into Standards Based Grading itself is challenging. It takes a lot of time and work. It is also a healthy one. Joining AHEA in 1961, Judy has been a member for 58 years and received her 50 year recognition in 2011.

Judy's professional career included high school home economics educator in Michigan and Wisconsin, Assistant Professor at Chicago State University and the University of Illinois. She served as Director of Program Evaluation and Research and later as VP of the National Dairy Council in Illinois and as Chair of the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences Education, Iowa State University until her retirement as Professor Emeritus in 2000.

Judy recently moved to Wisconsin and her involvement has included meetings with the Walworth County Home Economics group. She has been more involved at the national level during her professional career including AAFCS Journal editor, consultant to the certification program, committee and division chairs. Judy also served as president and board member of the Society for Nutrition Education.

Judy's family includes her husband, three children and 14 grandchildren.

When asked what changes she has seen in the profession Judy cited the changing role of women in the work place especially during the 1960s. The struggle to define family and our mission and goals along with the renaming of our profession has also brought many changes.
