**The Wisconsin Association of Family and Consumer Sciences (WAFCS) New Achiever for 2022 is Miranda Stroik, CFCS (Certified Family and Sciences).** Miranda was awarded this prestigious award at the WAFCS state conference held in Onalaska, WI at the Stoney Creek Hotel and Conference Center held on March 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>.

She is the Family and Consumer Sciences teacher for the DC Everest School District. She attended the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point for her bachelor's degree in Family and Consumer Sciences Education, Health Education and her Master's degree in Education.

As of December 2021, Miranda is a Servsafe instructor and proctor with National Restaurant Association. She was a local adviser for both Career, Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) and Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) while teaching at Sheboygan North. At her new placement, DC Everest Senior High, she started a HOSA chapter. Miranda has also served as a state HOSA adviser in 2018 and 2019. Miranda has chaperoned and judged at the 2019 HOSA International conference at Orlando in 2019. She also chaperoned and judged for the FCCLA National Conference at Anaheim in 2019. It takes major effort and commitment to be an adviser for both FCCLA and HOSA).

While teaching at North, She was an active member of the Lakeshore Technical College Culinary Advisory Committee. Other trainings Miranda has participated in are: Shaken Baby Syndrome (for which she is certified), Positive Behavior Intervention System (PBIS) training, and has completed phases 1 and 2 for the American Red Cross FAST program for

train the trainer. Recent webinars include a geriatric curriculum for teaching “Sensitivity and Care Across the Life Span” and “Tips for Starting a Hydroponics Program”.

Miranda initiated Sheboygan North’s Dual-Credit course offerings with Lakeshore Technical College Health Science’s department. Her design and implementation of curriculum has benefited specific cognitively disabled and multiple language students.

Miranda’s commitment to the profession and WAFCS is clear. In her role as New Membership representative, Miranda worked with the membership team to build the WAFCS Leadership Academy. As a conference planning co-chair, Miranda has assisted in the planning of this year’s excellent 2022 conference. The pre-conference (Pathway Palooza) and coordination with sponsors and expo partners highlights her leadership and organizational abilities now and in the future. We look forward to her continued Leadership with WAFCS.

One interesting volunteer activity, perhaps unknown to many, is her dedication to the Foundation for Hope in Africa. Miranda has been the project manager for two missionary trips to Africa, one to Malawi and one to Tanzania. She was the team lead to organize manage and support group members to test and donate over 2000 pairs of prescription eye glasses to those in need.

Words used in a letter of recommendation for Miranda are enthusiasm, inspiration, positivity, innovation, collaboration, pioneering and above all, a dedicated leader in the Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) and Health Sciences profession.

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**The Wisconsin Association of Family and Consumer Sciences (WAFCS) Teacher of the Year for 2022 is Susan Strutz, CFCS (Certified Family and Consumer Sciences).** Susan teaches middle and high school for the Wisconsin Dells School District. She is the adviser to the Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) Leaders in Action Dells Designs leadership group. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree from UW-Stevens Point and her Master of Arts in Education from Viterbo University in LaCrosse. With numerous DPI licenses, Susan also has additional certifications and training in the following areas: ServSafe: Food Protection Manager; Google Level 1 Certification; Population Education Trainer; Shaken Baby Syndrome and Abusive Head Trauma Trainer; as well training as a Food Literacy Educator. Susan is a Dual credit instructor and has added Dual Enrollment options to existing courses with Fox Valley Technical College for Health-Safety-Nutrition, and Advanced Foods.

Susan collaborated with the Agri-Science program to grow and procure fruits and vegetables and also to fillet and prep fish from an aquaponics system. Her signature program focuses on “Food Sustainability”. It’s a nine week curriculum entitled “Food Stories: Where Food Comes From”. The basic premise is to “plant a seed” in students to be conscious food consumers. The “Food Stories” curriculum enables students to calculate food miles when comparing and industrial food system to a local food system. Students are challenged to research what is “sustainable” in their community, regionally and globally. Core concepts include food: production, processing/distribution, preparation, sustainability and values. In 2020, Susan wrote a food sustainability lesson for the Wisconsin and Minnesota Pork Boards with support from the National Pork Board.

As many learners are drawn to processed foods, many are less aware that their foods came from places others than the grocery store. She connected her lessons to the National FCS Education Standards. Susan secured a Whole Foods Foundation grant to create a school garden. This created collaboration between the Agri-science, Biology and FCS programs. Together they designed and planted the space. The garden was also used for six sessions of elementary students during summer school. Students learned about different plants and cooking with garden produce.

Susan co-advises a Wisconsin Dells FCS Leaders group. She began a "Dells Design" student group which focuses on Community service. Their collaboration with the American Legion Auxiliary and fashion students, created four "Quilts of Valor" for veterans. Not only did they sew the quilts, the students were taught to properly present the quilts during the Veteran's Day assembly. Another project teamed up with a 4K class to make felt monsters based on the children's art work. Her students have used their skills to make pillowcases for "Ryan's Case Smiles Project" at the WAFCS conference in Onalaska, WI at the Stoney Creek Hotel and Conference Center held on March 3rd and 4th. This is where Susan received this prestigious award.

Another initiative that resulted from moving to a new high school in 2020 with lots of "green space" was collaboration with the Agri-Science program, to utilize gardens, the greenhouse and the aquaponics system. Another collaborative opportunity is the "Happy Kids Network" which oversees a "Vine Street Market" at the high school. The market is open 2-4 PM weekdays for students and families. The market receives a weekly shipment of food from Second Harvest.

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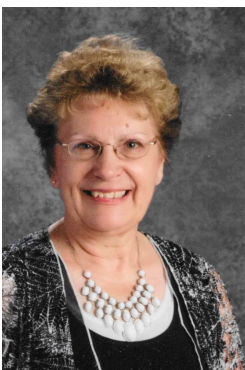

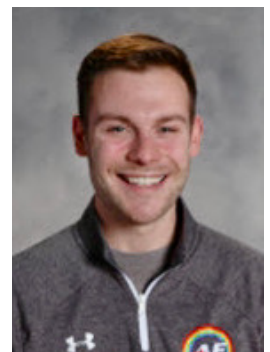

**700+ Pillow Cases Delivered**

## Foundation Announces 2022 Awards Successful First Basket Raffle Fundraiser

### Basket Raffle Fundraiser and Donations Enable Foundation Awards

For over 25 years, the Silent Auction was the Foundation's primary fundraiser and helped sponsor scholarships, grants, travelships, and more for student and professional WAFCS members. But we thought that it was time to "change it up" a little. Thanks to the leadership of Rita Houser, with help from Marilyn Swiontek, Carol Subera, and Jean Zeithaml, the Foundation's first attempt at sponsoring a Basket Raffle was a big success! Thanks to the members who donated 38 baskets and the 79 ticket purchasers, we were able to raise \$1,370!

An additional \$1,221 in Foundation donations were received around the time of the Annual Conference. As the Foundation awards more dollars than it generates during its fiscal year, this greatly contributes to the Foundation's ability

to make awards. We want to especially thank an Anonymous Donor who has been extremely generous to the Foundation over several years via the charitable IRA contribution, donating an additional \$1000 this past year.

The Foundation also pays WAFCS organizational membership dues (\$425) in the International Federation for Home Economics (IFHE) to support our profession at the international level. In addition, the Foundation provided a \$1,000 scholarship for a representative from an underdeveloped country to attend the IFHE World Congress in Atlanta this fall.

#### Scholarships and Travelships

Lauren Hayes and Ryan Lehman, both UW–Stevens Point students, were each awarded a \$500 Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship during the Awards Banquet of the WAFCS Annual Conference.

The following UW–Stevens Point students were awarded travelships of up to \$100 each to attend the 2022 WAFCS State Conference in Onalaska: Jessica Lange, Gabe Retzlaff, Laura Schechter, Kelly Yeakey, and Ryan Lehman.

Chloe Allen and Amber Miller were each awarded a \$125 Professional Stipend to attend the 2022 WAFCS State Conference. Both are first-year teachers in Horicon and Sheboygan respectively.

The Foundation honors WAFCS Award recipients by offering \$500 travelships to support their attendance at the AAFCS Annual Conference in the following year when they are in consideration for national recognition. Eligible for travelships this year are Donna Dinco (2021 WAFCS Leader Award), Michael Westbrook (2021 WAFCS New Achiever Award), and Kim Hart-Shatwell (2021 WAFCS Teacher of the Year). Students receiving travelships (up to \$300 each) to attend the 2022 AAFCS Annual Conference in Orlando, Florida are Noah Gaffney, Ryan Lehman, and Kelly Yeakey, all of UW–Stevens Point.

#### Revised Foundation Bylaws and Policies

The Foundation has revised its Bylaws and Policies to align with the recently revised WAFCS Bylaws and Policies.

Proposed revised Foundation Bylaws and Policies were presented to the WAFCS Executive Board and approved at their January 6 meeting via the WAFCS Professional Development Committee.

The following is a summary of the changes/clarifications that were made to the Foundation Bylaws and Policies:

1. The purpose of the Foundation remains the same: to support the purposes of WAFCS.
2. The Foundation is now less autonomous.
3. The WAFCS Finance Committee has fiscal oversight of the Foundation.
4. The WAFCS Professional Development Committee provides program direction and support to the Foundation.
5. The Foundation works through the WAFCS Finance Committee and the WAFCS Professional Development Committee to report to and relate with the WAFCS Executive Board.
6. The Foundation Board has authority to make decisions on previously approved and budgeted “awards,” such as scholarships, grants, travelships, incentive to achieve AAFCS Certification, etc. Only when the Foundation has a new proposal for a fundraising idea or award does it need to go through the appropriate WAFCS Committee and WAFCS Executive Board for consideration and approval.
