Saturday Morning Keynote Speaker

Deborah Blum

"The Poison Squad: This talk, based on the book, The Poison Squad, and centered on the work of a federal crusading chemist, Harvey Washington Wiley, will take a look at the American food and drink supply in the wild west days before federal regulation (it's bad), explore the deeply political, business-influenced battle for regulation, and raise the questions of how culture, politics and the regulatory framework established in the early 20th century still affect us today."

The Poison Squad

Deborah Blum is a highly acclaimed science journalist, Pulitzer Prize-winning author, and co-editor of *A Field Guide for Science Writers*. She is also the Knight Science Journalism program director at Massachusetts Institute for Technology.

Hear about the struggles for food safety from the expert herself. This keynote presentation will be worth the registration cost in itself.

Saturday Afternoon Keynote Speaker

Dr. Neil Prendergast, "A Consumer Bill of Rights: How One Food Company Responded to 1970s Activism"

This presentation investigates the story behind Giant Foods' hiring of a longtime consumer activist to represent the



supermarket chain amid a decade of public distrust. The 1970s witnessed deep ambivalence among consumers regarding the fairness of grocery prices and the health claims of processed foods. Giant Foods responded by hiring Esther Peterson, a veteran consumer activist, as a spokesperson. Her "Consumer Bill of Rights" committed Giant to now standard practices, such as unit pricing, recycling, and other measures. Peterson's work drew directly from her earlier experiences as a union organizer and official within the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations, where she advanced the cause of gender equality. Her work for Giant thus allows a wide consideration of how food companies internalized social activism to regain the public trust.

Dr. Neil Prendergast teaches history at UW-Stevens Point. His courses include Food in Modern America, U.S. Environmental History, Designing the American Dream, and Environmental Justice. Prendergast earned his PhD in environmental history from the University of Arizona. His published work includes "Raising the Thanksgiving Turkey: Agroecology, Gender, and the Knowledge of Nature," which appeared in Environmental History and "Food and Environment," which appeared in the Routledge History of American Foodways.

IFHE World Congress

The IFHE World Congress scheduled for September 2022 in Atlanta is in the reset mode. This simply means updated plans are unfolding and we have opportunity to be engaged.

Plans for the Pre-Conference for Educators is a time to learn, share, and network in a global community. Consider joining the event and learning from others as well as developing relationships with colleagues around the world. With technology platforms, it might be an opportunity to find partners for helping students expand their global knowledge.



Conference planners have established a schedule for accepting abstracts for either presentations or posters during the Congress. You may have submitted an abstract for the 2020 event so why not update it and submit again.

Abstracts fit in one of four categories: research, best practices, exhibition, or meeting. Research abstracts can be either oral or a poster and showcase work completed or in process. Best practices can be shared orally, as a poster, or in a workshop setting. What we are doing everyday certainly has possibilities for this category. The exhibition category focuses on textiles and may be fabric, a garment, or accessory related to the Congress theme *Soaring Toward Sustainable Development*. In the past, this has been one of the highlights of a Congress as garments and accessories have been stunning. The meeting category may be the least likely to be of interest as it focuses on committee and group meetings. However, what could be of interest is a topic promoting international collaboration and basically inviting a group to come together around a topic.

There is time to ponder ideas as submissions will be accepted between June 1, 2021 and August 31, 2021.

Recommended Reading and/or viewing: The Poison Squad by Deborah Blum (Conference Keynote speaker)

Fascinating recounting of the American food supply being tainted with frauds, fakes and legions of new and untested chemicals, dangerously threatening the health of consumers. Beginning a century ago the problems may still sound familiar. This is an especially interesting story of the struggles of a Purdue U (and later US Government) chemist who was determined to banish these harmful substances from the dinner table. He took on the powerful food manufacturers and their allies. Women in Domestic Science and the Suffrage Movement joined him as undaunted advocates.
