

Integrating AI into my Culinary Arts Classroom

With less than six weeks until the WAFCS Annual Conference, both attendees and presenters are preparing for two inspiring days of learning, networking, and celebrating our profession. As a presenter, I would like to offer a brief preview of what I have learned as I begin integrating AI into my Culinary Arts classroom.

My journey with AI began during a schoolwide inservice that encouraged educators to embrace AI rather than avoid it. While I do not consider myself an expert, I have come to appreciate how tools such as ChatGPT and MagicSchool AI can enhance classroom efficiency and deepen student learning in a culinary arts setting, while also supporting real-world skill development. These AI platforms help students strengthen recipe comprehension by breaking down complex techniques, adjusting portion sizes, and modifying recipes to meet dietary needs, including allergies or cultural preferences. Most recently, I have used ChatGPT to standardize my classroom recipes into clear, easy-to-read formats tailored to a variety of reading levels.

For educators, MagicSchool AI streamlines lesson planning, assessment creation, and instructional differentiation. It enables teachers to efficiently generate rubrics, lab reflections, safety quizzes, and accommodations for diverse learners, freeing valuable time for hands-on instruction and individualized student support in the kitchen. I previously struggled to create rubrics that addressed the wide range of culinary arts topics I teach; however, by inputting my criteria into MagicSchool AI, I now have customized rubrics tailored to each of my baking labs.

When used responsibly, AI becomes a learning partner rather than a shortcut. Teachers can model ethical use by emphasizing originality, verification of information, and real-world application. By incorporating ChatGPT and MagicSchool AI, culinary arts classrooms become more inclusive, engaging, and aligned with industry expectations, while empowering students to use emerging technology as a professional resource they will encounter beyond the classroom.

If you are new to incorporating AI into your classroom, I invite you to join Theresa Schreiber and me for our session at 10:15 a.m. on Friday morning. In addition, Amanda Drews will be presenting Fueling Disciplinary Literacy through AI in FCS Classrooms at 9:15 a.m. Together, these sessions offer an opportunity to build confidence, expand capacity, and deepen our understanding of how AI can effectively support teaching and learning in FCS classrooms.


As AI is a technology everyone is impacted by, educators need to consider how it can be integrated into classrooms and used to help students develop critical thinking skills. The IAVES strategy outlined is beneficial in designing tasks that require students to go beyond having AI generate a basic response to a prompt. The authors state the need for “learners who blend technical knowledge with durable skills such as critical thinking, communication, collaboration, adaptability, creativity, leadership and emotional intelligence (Hutson & Ceballos, 2023) along with the attitudes needed to engage with, design and manage AI responsibly” (pg 8). The IAVES strategy intentionally creates structured moments to question validity, determine what to revise, and incorporate personalized connections to the content generated by AI. The key is not to avoid AI, but rather to engage in human-centered AI interactions. Be sure to read the full article in the November/December 2025 issue of Techniques.
