AAMC awards eight \$25,000 grants to study the impact of existing integrative arts and humanities programs

Grantees will design new methodology, or enhance existing methodology, to evaluate the impact of existing integrative arts and humanities programs or curricula across the developmental spectrum (undergraduate, graduate, and continuing medical education and interprofessional settings). Priority was given to programs that serve veterans and underrepresented minorities. This work is partially funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities. Learn more.

Activity ideas for teaching and assessing medical knowledge

The FRAHME Getting Started Guide offers activity ideas for educators seeking to incorporate arts and humanities into their teaching.
