Fellow Vaccine Efforts

Kristen M. Swanson, PhD, RN, FAAN, Dean and Professor, Seattle University College of Nursing, serves as Chair of the Board of Trustees for Swedish Health Services in Seattle, WA. She was able to connect the CEO of Swedish with the President, Provost, and Chief Legal Counsel at Seattle University to launch a clinic "Swedish@SeattleU" in less than 8 days. In four hours on Day 1, close to 1,100 vaccines were administered. In the first month – working 3 to 4 days per week – approximately 31,000 doses have been administered. Swedish has also launched a mobile clinic which selects communities based on concentration of COVID cases, providing approximately 200 doses per day. A particularly newsworthy event was a call Dr. Swanson received at 9:45 PM saying they needed to staff a 'pop-up' clinic on campus at 11:00 PM, after a local hospital had a freezer breakdown that would have resulted in expired doses if not used that night. Dr. Swanson sent out an

all-points bulletin (APB) for vaccinators and volunteers and between 11:00 PM and 3:00 AM, 897 doses were administered.



As Galveston County froze over, nurses delivered COVID vaccines to homebound patients



From the Article:

"We gave vaccine by flashlights inside people's homes, because they have no power," said Jennifer Young, a nurse practitioner who works in the medical branch's program for homebound elderly residents.

During the freeze, the nurses weren't just delivering shots. Amid the blackouts and weather-damaged pipes bursting, nurses delivered water, blankets, coffee and breakfast tacos, Young said. In one case, Young even helped arrange for someone to go to a patient's house to turn off the water.
