Pharmaceutical Company “Price Gouging” and the Effect on Volunteer Participation in Clinical Trials

Controversy on the high cost of medications is all over the news recently. With debate over a reasonable price for drugs like Gleevec (a cancer medication) and Sofosbuvir (a medication for Hepatitis C) everyone from presidential candidates to regular citizens have an opinion on what drives the costs.

While the true reasons most likely have basis in many different areas (such as demand, salaries, profits for investors, cost of manufacturing) some drug companies have come out blaming the high cost of research.

"Here's the reality: Most of the medicines we develop in our labs will not make their way to patients ... To make up for the risk and expense inherent in creating new medicines, the few medicines that are successful must cover the research and development costs of the many clinical failures that will never earn a single cent. It's easy to forget that profits serve an important purpose: they allow businesses to invest in the innovations of the future." This “blame the research” mentality makes it difficult for researchers (sites and CROs) to recruit volunteers since the trust of the community is degraded. With missed enrollment deadlines come higher research costs.

What the pharmaceutical industry needs is consumer trust. How the price gouging debates will affect that will be interesting to watch.

What's Happening Locally?

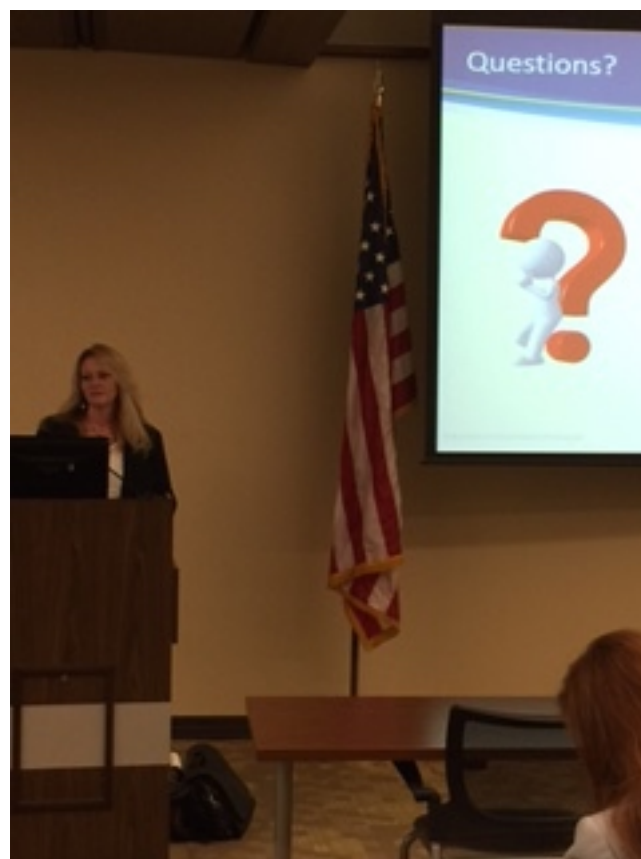
“The History and Current State of the IRB in our Industry”

Toni Gerrity, Director of IRB Operations at Midland IRB presented “The History and Current State of the IRB in our Industry”.

During a great presentation with an informative slide deck, Gerrity gave a very interesting and in-depth history on the unregulated clinical trials and the reasons we have these guidelines today.























Gerrity then went on to explain the role of the IRB in clinical trials and how that role has expanded over the years.
