MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$98,902

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care

Home-based: \$12,598

Center-based: \$17.707

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

- Home-based: \$10,774
- Center-based: \$11,709

This is **11%-12%** of a family's income.
