How much are families paying for child care?

MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$125,343

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care



Home-based: **\$13,370**



Center-based: **\$19,292**

This is **11%-15%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care



Home-based: **\$12,240**



Center-based: **\$14,023**

This is **10%-11%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: **\$14,579**
