MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$90,381

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care



Home-based: **\$12,224**



Center-based: **\$19,053**

This is **14%-21%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care



Home-based: **\$10,209**



Center-based: **\$13,985**

This is **11%-15%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: **\$14,579**
