### What child care options are available to families?

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227 Child care centers can serve up to 18,805 children

68 Licensed child care homes can serve up to 696 children

### How much are families paying for child care?

MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$139,620

**INFANT:** Average annual price of licensed care

Home-based: \$13,570

Center-based: \$20,384

This is 10%-15% of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

Home-based: \$12,282

Center-based: \$15,135

This is 9%-11% of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: \$14,579
