MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$90,412

**INFANT:** Average annual price of licensed care

Home-based: \$11,050

Center-based: \$16,075

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

Home-based: \$9,596

Center-based: \$11,184

This is 11%-12% of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: \$14,579
