21 Child care centers can serve up to **1,193** children



66 Licensed child care homes can serve up to **667** children

How much are families paying for child care?

MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$80,266

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care



Home-based: **\$11,003**



Center-based: **\$16,710**

This is **14%-21%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care



Home-based: **\$9,665**



Center-based: **\$11,329**

This is **12%-14%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: **\$14,579**
