Child Care Options for Families

-  **39** child care centers with capacity to serve up to **4,702** children
-  **33** licensed child care homes with capacity to serve up to **301** children
-  **86** license-exempt home caregivers serve around **193** children

Child Care Is Expensive for Many Families

MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$66,620



Average annual cost of licensed care: **INFANT**

-  Home-based: **\$10,723**
-  Center-based: **\$15,093**

This is **16%-23%** of a family's income.

This rivals college tuition: **\$14,166**

Average annual cost of licensed care: **PRESCHOOLER**

-  Home-based: **\$9,784**
-  Center-based: **\$11,992**

This is **15%-18%** of a family's income.

Early Care and Education Programs Support Children and Families

CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

2,974 children served
926 children age 0-2
1,033 children age 3-5

The Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP), funded through the Illinois Department of Human Services, helps families pay for child care while they work or go to school. Families are eligible if they earn below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, or \$42,660 for a family of three.

EARLY CHILDHOOD BLOCK GRANT

1,599 children served
8 Prevention Initiative programs
300 children age 0-2
7 Preschool for All programs
1,299 children age 3-5

Early Childhood Block Grant funds from the Illinois State Board of Education provide high-quality early education opportunities through Preschool for All (PFA) part- and full-day programs for 3- and 4-year-olds and Prevention Initiative services for infants, toddlers, and expectant families. Programs are expected to prioritize children determined to be at-risk.

HEAD START & EARLY HEAD START

352 children served
1 Early Head Start sites
25 children age 0-2
3 Head Start sites
327 children age 3-5

Head Start programs for 3- and 4-year-olds, along with Early Head Start for infants and toddlers, are federally-funded early education programs for families living below the poverty line and designed to meet the comprehensive needs of families.
