

AEJMC Resolution Honors Fallen TV Reporter

Even before gathering in Washington, DC for our 2023 Annual conference, AEJMC members will be asked to vote on a resolution that honors a young reporter while calling for journalism educators to prepare students to cover mass shootings.

Dylan Lyons, an award-winning journalist and alumnus of the Nicholson School of Communication and Media at University of Central Florida was the victim of a tragic shooting while reporting for Spectrum News 13 on Feb. 22, 2023.

"No one should have to worry about losing their lives while doing their jobs," said Robert Littlefield, director of the Nicholson School. "Dylan's passing is a major loss for our entire community."

"The Dylan Lyons Resolution" notes that he is one of an increasing number of journalists who lost their lives while on the job within the U.S.

As the AEJMC conference begins, the resolution will be shared at a special panel, "Beyond Thoughts and Prayers" that will feature a member of the faculty at UCF as well as other faculty who have engaged students in reporting on the aftermath of mass shootings or conducted research on how journalists cover mass shootings.

The panel takes place Monday, August 7 at 12:30 p.m.

Voting on the Dylan Lyons Resolution will open online in mid-July and remain open until the end of the AEJMC Conference.

BAMJ Sets New Record with 38 Submissions for Upcoming Conference

The Broadcast and Mobile Journalism Division received 38 submissions for the upcoming annual conference, marking a 40.7% increase from the previous year. As some of our readers may already know, AEJMC experienced a record-high number of submissions this year. Still, our metrics outpaced the overall 29.5% increase in conference submissions by over 10 percentage points, highlighting our thriving presence within the AEJMC community.

Approximately two out of three submissions were full-text manuscripts, and one was an extended abstract, a format accepted by all AEJMC divisions and interest groups this year, continuing a practice begun during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The overall acceptance rate for BAMJ submissions was 50%, with extended abstracts facing tougher competition than full-text papers in securing a spot on the conference program (35.7% vs. 58.3% acceptance rates, respectively). These figures mirror the acceptance statistics for the AEJMC conference as a whole: 34.2% for extended abstracts vs. 57.5% for full papers.


Fast-tracked Podcast Study Moves from 2023 Southeast Colloquium to Publication

Some cutting research on daily news podcasting that originated in the Broadcast and Mobile Journalism (BAMJ) Division at the 48th Annual AEJMC Southeast Colloquium is already in publication.

Chad Whittle's paper "Preliminary Study on the Gratifications Received by Listeners of Daily News Podcasts," was one of three presented in the BAMJ Division at the Colloquium, which was held at Middle Tennessee State University's School of Journalism and Strategic Media in March.

Whittle recently wrote me to share the good news that the paper was now accepted for publication in *Journal of Radio and Audio Media*. I served as the moderator/discussant for this BAMJ research session.



Marquita Smith, Leah Smith and Dorothy Bland shared early results of their study entitled "Exploring the CROWN Act the Evolution of Natural Black Hair Tales in TV News."

Also, Travis Shortt presented findings from his study on "Using Social Media Tools for Engagement with Rural Radio Audiences."

Community media consumption, real-time video emergence, local civic organizing, and acts of democratic and disinformation agency, all tend to happen on mobile first. With 5G speeds being 10 times more than 4G, and low latencies allowing substantially more real-time interaction on demand, new metaverse apps are already taking shape. In due course, new participatory models for news making and journalism are likely to emerge. Some models may even pay better for local journalists using decentralized web and crypto tokens. It is also possible that new local news experiences including in broadcast form will become profitable on the metaverse, including local advertisers. But oftentimes, questions of ethics are raised only after the fact or after a crisis has emerged. Discussing hypothetical scenarios of news breaking, and participation in the news gathering in these new media environments will help more than hurt. Especially to avoid the perils of journalism's encounters with social media that led to many after-the-fact ethics advisories to be issued. This panel will outline a few questions and scenarios to discuss.

This panel aims to enable a scholarly discussion to examine how newsrooms in different countries across the globe adopt AI technologies in news production and distribution and what implications this might have on professional journalism and press freedom. In particular, panelists will discuss the challenges of adopting AI technology in small and medium-sized local newsrooms where the lack of financial resources, digital skills, and journalistic training pose many restrictions on the application of AI-driven tools. This will help bridge the current gap in research that focuses mainly on investigating AI technologies in the large legacy media organizations that have innovation labs to develop automated news technologies such as BBC, the Guardian, and the Washington Post.

Not VR Too! Avoiding Stereotypes in Multimedia and Immersive News

VR is a technology that generates an immersive experience, engaging users in a multisensory sequence of events. VR technologies and platforms have been utilized to create sensory and immersive experiences for the creative and the cultural heritage industries, from film and gaming environments to interactive journalism. Because of the nature of the platforms used as well as the stark and immediate character of the technology itself, VR has also found use in therapy as it constitutes an experimental tool to elicit emotional responses from its users. For example, experiencing the fear and trauma of a victim of domestic violence if situated in the room with his or her abuser, or experiencing the panic of war within the users' own city and the helplessness of becoming a refugee when the user is placed in the role of the refugee. Many of these VR narratives, however, are recreating problematic tropes of minorities. This panel will explore how VR has been, and is currently, reinforcing stereotypes and "othering" minority avatars in interactive journalism. We will further discuss the affordances of interactive journalism as performed in VR in order to determine if and how prosocial attitudes may lead to longer term, or "sticky" social change. Beginning from the analytical lens of empathy, anathy, and voyeurism, we suggest that user agency must guide the virtual reality design process so that the user is given multiple scenarios of enacting change at various levels. By doing so, rather than merely experiencing "the other", the user may begin to rewrite their social scripts and practice prosocial behaviors; which are psycho-social indicators of longer term change.
