

This year's Student Magazine
Contest included 137 entries
from 21 colleges and
universities across nine
categories. It was an
impressive slate of entries, and
one that speaks volumes for the
future of magazine journalism
– those were the words of
Richard Just, one of the general
excellence judges.

"I found it really inspiring to read all the great work being done by student journalists across the country," he wrote. "To see the effort and talent on display in these publications gives me a lot of hope for the future of our profession."

The contest was judged by 13 working journalists who

volunteered their time and expertise, including journalists from Slate, The 19th, Real Simple, Texas Monthly, New York Times Magazine, WWD and more. General Excellence remains the largest category with 26 entries. Among the writing categories, Features and Profiles are the largest. Essay and Service are smallest.


