Legislation would aid vets, first responders, with PTSD

New legislation proposed to help provide mental health services to first responders struggling with PTSD

First Responder PTSD

- It is real and resources to deal with the problem are needed
- Legislation is, or soon will be, introduced in nearly every state to **mandate** a **PTSD workers' compensation presumption for first responders**, especially for the fire service
- When you begin to see regular news stories on the topic, you will know that a legislative push will follow
- Initial legislation proposals **may include a presumption for any** "adjustment disorder" which can mean almost any kind of stress

Problems and Solution

- Biggest complaint by our public safety members was: EAP providers/counselors in general don't know what we do
- People call and get no help so don't want to call again if experiencing issues
- Goal of SDAO/SDIS was to find a provider that understood the public safety workforce



Be Prepared and Proactive

- We knew legislation was coming and that there was a lack of mental health resources for first responders
- The firefighters' union argued that EAP was useless and ineffective
- We worked with the union to identify an EAP provider that could offer a panel of providers trusted and respected by the fire service
- We then asked the union to endorse the EAP if we provided it free of charge to all paid firefighters
- It is now a co-branded program with SDIS and OSFFC

PTSD Presumption Negotiations

- Having a co-branded EAP program took away the argument that resources don't exist
- We emphasized that prevention of PTSD should be the focus
- The union wanted a bill that would provide a presumption for any stressrelated conditions diagnosed by a mental health professional, which could have included counselors
- Ultimately having the EAP program **helped us negotiate an agreement to limit the presumption to PTSD medical conditions** as diagnosed by a physician
- We jointly testified in support of the final negotiated bill with the union

- > Work/life benefits
- > Lifestyle benefits
- > Wellness resource center
- > Two on-site trauma responses per year

Implementation

- January 1st, 2019: Started by offering all career firefighters, EMTs and 911 communication entities in Oregon the EAP program for 6 months
- July 1st, 2019: Three-year agreement to offer all career firefighters, EMTs and 911 communication entities in Oregon the EAP program
- Over 3,500 public safety employees enrolled year one
- Initial program did not include volunteer firefighters

Implementation

2020

offered members to pay for volunteer and administrative staff for a fee to have access to EAP



2022

going after the AFG Grant again for volunteers

SDAO partnered with a fire district member and applied in 2020 for an AFG Grant to cover over 10,000 volunteer firefighters (did not receive grant)

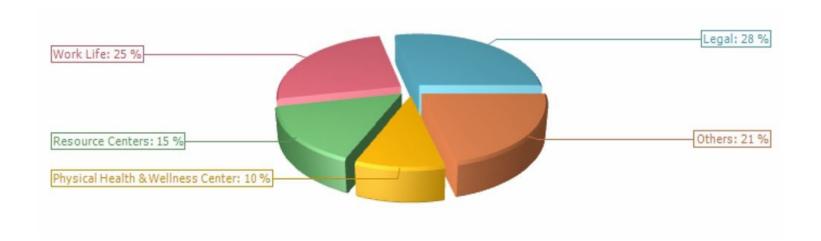

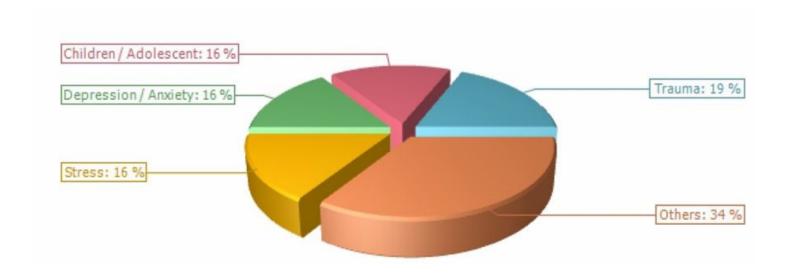

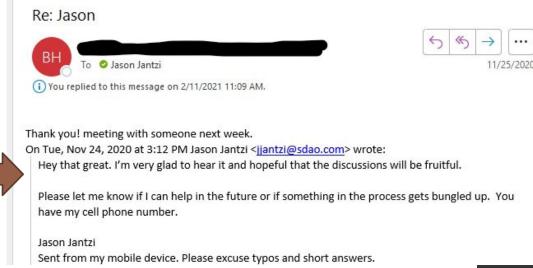
Reach out if you need something, and I will check in on you next week to see if you were able to connect with them.
