

Setbacks

- Lag time
- They say no
- Different modalities
- Not properly staffed (either office)
- Students not engaging



Creating Connections

Feedback from CRCs

- Provides students with information to another resource
- Incorporate DRC more into events
- Smoother handoffs within centers

Feedback from AC

- Connections were more productive at events
- Going every month was more beneficial than going twice a month



How to improve

- After each year we send out an email to get feedback from the CRC's
- Attending events that the CRC holds
- Based on date the centers collect we plan our drop-in hours when they usually have most traffic
