
#### Ten Years with a Campus-wide Committee on Accessibility: Accomplishments and Lessons Learned

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#### Committee on Accessibility (CoA) – Origins

- Disability Studies Faculty Learning Community (FLC) in 2014-15
- Proposal to the Provost in Spring 2015 to become a formal committee
- Campus Climate Survey Data



#### 2014 Campus Climate Survey Results

- Individuals who experienced exclusionary, intimidating, offensive, or hostile conduct:
  - 40% of respondents with mental health/psychological conditions (n = 32)
  - 34% of respondents with multiple disabilities (n = 26)
  - 32% of respondents with physical disabilities (n = 60)
  - 24% of respondents with learning disabilities/conditions (n = 26)
  - 24% of people with no disabilities (n = 4443)



#### 2014 Campus Climate Survey Results Continued

- Areas reported to be most "fully accessible"
  - Student Union (57%)
  - Restrooms (55%)
  - Elevators (53%)
  - Website (56%)
- Areas of concern:
  - Parking
  - Walkways
  - Ramps
  - Elevators





### **CoA – General Information**

- The Mission of the Committee Accessibility at SUNY Brockport is to:
  - 1. promote and advocate for accessibility for all students, faculty, staff, and visitors
  - 2. increase awareness related to the needs of individuals with disabilities on campus, and
  - 3. develop coursework for students to study disability
- The committee is comprised of members from multiple campus constituencies including Student Accessibility Services (SAS), students (including at least one student with a disability), faculty, and staff (including a representative from facilities

#### CoA – Administrative Structure and Funding

- Began under Academic Affairs
  - Reporting to the Provost
- Currently operate under the umbrella of the Office for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion
  - Chief Diversity Officer is a member of University Cabinet
- Shifts in funding over the past 10 years have affected the scope of committee goals and activities

- 2. Accessible Events Checklist
- 3. Free American Sign Language (ASL) classes for faculty, staff, and graduate students
- 4. Numerous speakers and events
  - Disability activists
  - Paralympians
  - Disability Studies conference









#### Major Accomplishments Continued

- 5. Stickers for Push Pad door openers
- Grant funding for everyday for campus events and sport wheelchairs for instruction and events
- 7. Coordinating with student clubs to plan and implement Accessibility Explorations intended to identify problematic areas on our campus
- 8. Directly addressing accessibility barriers at our university and advocating for systemic change
  - Campus construction



# Work in Progress

- Institutional Cultural Change
- Disability Cultural Center
  - Working group formed to explore a sensory-friendly space
  - Possible name "Zen Den"
  - Potential site identified at Brockport Downtown; library may be a potential location on main campus
  - Ongoing discussions regarding approval processes and funding
- Additional signage
  - Contact info for issues
  - Positioned near elevators



## **Future Plans**

- American Sign Language (ASL) Classes for Faculty, Staff and Graduate Students
  - Would like to offer two classes in 25-26 (Fall and Spring)
  - Additional funding will be required to support this
- Screening of "Intelligent Lives" in Fall 2025
  - Facilitation by Jeiri Flores. \$250 honorarium approved.
- Other Possible Events:
  - "Spellers" documentary
  - Guest Speaker: Anita Cameron, disability rights activist from Rochester
