We had a great time at the 14th International Research Workshop in Information Technology Project Management (IRWITPM). The event included research presentations on Agile Project Management, Project Management Skills and Leadership, and Project Management Skills Foundations. The event was sponsored by our long-term partner, the Project Management Institute (PMI). Fred Niederman, Co-Editor for the Project Management Journal, talked about the latest research in the Project Management space. Ashley Forsyth, Academic Programs Specialist at the Project Management Institute, talked about opportunities available from PMI. In all, we had about 26 people in attendance. In terms of submissions, we had eight submissions, four "Completed" Research Papers, and four "In Progress" Research Papers.

We also presented several awards. **Noel Carroll** and **Kieran Conboy** from Lero, National University of Ireland Galway, won the Best Paper Award for their paper on Applying Normalization Process Theory to Explain Large-Scale Agile Transformations. **Meghann L. Drury-Grogan** from Fordham University, **Michael Erskine** from Middle Tennessee State University, and **Paul Witman** from California Lutheran University all won Best Reviewer Awards.

#### **Submission Process**

The manuscript or proposal and any supporting documentation (such as survey instruments) should be sent as e-mail attachments (in MSWord format) to the IRWITPM Conference Chairs at:

UNOIRWITPM@mail.unomaha.edu. In your email, please clearly identify your paper as a research-in-progress (RIP) or a completed paper. Authors should use the submission template provided on the SIG website. All submissions to IRWITPM must represent original work that has not already been published in a journal or conference proceedings. If the work has been presented at another conference or is currently under consideration for publication or presentation elsewhere, the authors must disclose this fact. Authors of accepted submissions must address the suggestions (if any) of the reviewers and submit an electronic copy of the final version of their work by the specified deadline. Failure to do so will result in withdrawal of this work from further consideration and it will not be included on the final program. All final papers will be published in the form of eproceedings available via the AIS eLibrary. Finally, at least one author for every accepted paper and all members of accepted panels must register for the workshop and be prepared to present their ideas in person.
