PARAST RECEIVES 2005 WRAY JACKSON SMITH SCHOLARSHIP - NOMINATIONS FOR 2006 AWARD SOUGHT By Bob Groves

Wray Jackson Smith, D.Sc, was a trustee and president of the Harris Smith Institutes of Arlington, Virginia, a nonprofit research foundation and a senior statistical advisor at Synectics for Management Decisions, Inc., where he had worked since 1986. Dr. Smith also held a number of technical/scientific senior executive positions in Federal agencies and retired from the Federal Government in 1983 as Director of the U.S. Department of Energy's Energy Information Administration and as Assistant Administrator for Energy Systems and Support. After his sudden death in May 2000 the Section on Government Statistics of the American Statistical Association, together with the Section on Social Statistics, the Washington Statistical Society, the Caucus for Women in Statistics, the Harris-Smith Institutes, Mathematica Policy Research, and Synectics for Management Decisions, Inc. established a scholarship in his memory. The scholarship is awarded annually to one outstanding applicant in order to further his or her career in government statistics.



Layla Parast, an undergraduate at the University of Texas, Austin, received the 2005 Wray Jackson Smith Fellowship. She is now a graduate student in statistics at Stanford University. When asked how she used the fellowship money, she recently replied, "The fellowship check went straight to fall quarter tuition at Stanford. Last quarter I took Theory of Probability with Dr. Persi Diaconis, Intro to Computing with Dr. Eric Roberts and Functions of a Real Variable with Dr. Taiping Lui. This quarter I am taking Intro to Stochastic Processes and Intro to Statistical Inference, both with Dr. Romano and Multivariate Analysis with Dr. Owen. ... I really love Stanford! Last quarter was extremely difficult but then again I would be a little skeptical if it had been easy."

Past Recipients

Dr. Jennifer Park was the recipient of the 2004 Wray Jackson Smith Scholarship.

Dr. Park used the scholarship to attend a December 2004 course in sampling design taught by Colm O'Muircheartaigh and James Lepkowski through the Joint Program in Survey Methodology (JPSM). She also enhanced her collection of statistical reference books, particularly those regarding estimation of effect size.

Yun Li was the recipient of the WJSS in 2003. She was a student in the Department of Applied Statistics and Operations Research, where she completed her Master's degree. Ms. Li used the WJSS scholarship to fund continued public policy research at the Bowling Green State University Center for Policy Analysis and Public Service. Her work was presented at the Mid-Continent Regional Science Association annual conference in Cleveland, Ohio.

Amelia Haviland was the recipient of the WJSS in 2002. She was a student at Carnegie Mellon University and used the scholarship to attend a short course on non-sampling error and the Joint Statistical Meetings in 2002.

New Nominations Sought

Nominations are now sought for the 2006 Wray Jackson Smith Scholarship. The 2006 recipient of the scholarship will be chosen by a committee of representatives of the Government Statistics Section and the Social Statistics Section of the American Statistical Association (Bob Groves, committee chair, Juanita Tamayo Lott and Michael P. Cohen). Dr. Smith was associated with and strongly supportive of these organizations during his career. The scholarship of \$1,000.00 can be used for activities like the following:

- 1. Attendance at a conference, short course, or long course.
- 2. Travel to a conference.
- 3. Purchase of government data.
- 4. Costs associated with research.

Please note the Wray Jackson Smith Scholarship Eligibility Requirements:

- 1. Bachelor's degree or equivalent.
- 2. Participation in the advancement of government statistics, whether as a government employee, researcher under government contract or using government statistics, or student involved with government statistics.

I thought I would devote this month's column to describing and highlighting the process we use to develop our slate of candidates and to share with you some information about our past voting record.

Selecting Candidates

Each fall, the Social Statistics Section Chair-elect works with the current Chair and the past Chair to develop a slate comprised of two names for each position. Individuals can volunteer to run, can be nominated by others, or are directly solicited by those responsible for developing the slate. The good news with this process is that it is relatively easy to be considered for a board position. The downside though, is that if we don't hear from volunteers or receive nominations, we have to 'encourage' individuals whom we know to be willing to run. This can result in a smaller group of our members being considered for board positions. However, I was surprised and delighted to learn that our section has almost 800 members! Thus, we do have a large pool of potential candidates from which to draw. Since it is important that our board represent our full membership to the greatest extent possible, please consider volunteering to run next fall for a position or to nominate one of your colleagues.

Casting Your Vote

This year's Social Statistics Section slate includes outstanding candidates for **2008 Chair**, **2008 Program Chair**, **2007-2008 Publications Officer**, and **2007-2008 Council of Sections Representative**. Please take the time to vote for both the ASA Board of Directors as well as for the Social Statistics Section candidates. In 2005, slightly more than 25 percent of our section's members participated in the election of our officers, but I know we can do better. And to make it easy for you, ASA is offering the option to vote by paper ballot or online (instructions for voting online will be on the paper ballot and online at www.amstat.org). Voting will be open to members March 15-May 15, 2006, and during the election process, you will be able to view the candidate's biographies and photos through the ASA website. Paper ballots will be mailed to all members by March 15.

Supporting Your Section and Your Association

The election of officers for our section and our association is an important responsibility. I take it seriously and I hope you will, too. I also hope by shedding a little light on the process you will be encouraged to vote – either online or by paper ballot during the window of opportunity. HERRIOT AWARD NOMINATIONS SOUGHT

Nominations are being sought for the **2006 Roger Herriot Award for Innovation in Federal Statistics.** The award is intended to reflect the special characteristics that marked Roger Herriot's career:

- Improvements in the efficiency of data collection programs; and
- Improvements and use of statistical data for policy analysis.

The award is not limited to senior members of an organization, nor is it to be considered as a culmination of a long period of service. Individuals at all levels within Federal agencies, other government organizations, nonprofits, the private sector, and the academic community may be nominated on the basis of their contributions.

The recipient of the 2006 Roger Herriot Award will be chosen by a committee comprising representatives of the Social Statistics and Government Statistics Sections of the American Statistical Association and of the Washington Statistical Society. Roger Herriot was associated with and strongly supportive of these organizations during his career. The award consists of an honorarium and a framed citation.

NOMINATIONS SOUGHT FOR 2006 JULIUS SHISKIN AWARD

Nominations are invited for the annual **Julius Shiskin Memorial Award for Economic Statistics.** The Award is given in recognition of unusually original and important contributions in the development of economic statistics or in the use of statistics in interpreting the economy. Contributions are recognized for statistical research, development of statistical tools, application of information technology techniques, use of economic statistical programs, management of statistical programs, or developing public understanding of measurement issues. The Award was established in 1980 by the Washington Statistical Society (WSS) and is now cosponsored by the WSS, the National Association for Business Economics, and the Business and Economics Statistics Section of the American Statistical Association. The 2005 award recipient was Erwin Diewert, University of British Columbia, in recognition of his path-breaking economic theoretical innovations, notably in index number theory, which have been adapted to improve national economic statistics around the world.

Nominations for the 2006 award are now being accepted. Individuals or groups in the public or private sector from any country can be nominated. THE JEANNE E. GRIFFITH MENTORING AWARD

The Jeanne E. Griffith Mentoring Award has been established to encourage mentoring of younger staff in the Federal statistical system. It is presented annually, beginning in 2003, to a supervisor who is nominated by co-workers and supervisors, and chosen by the Award Selection Committee.

The award is co-sponsored by the Interagency Council on Statistical Policy, the Council for Excellence in Government, the Washington Statistical Society, the Social Statistics and Government Statistics Sections of the American Statistical Association, and the Council of Professional Associations on Federal Statistics.

Nominations for 2006 will be accepted beginning in **February 2006**. The last date for submission of nominations is **March 31, 2006**, and the Award Committee will make its determination of the award winner by May 1, 2006. The award will consist of a \$1,000 honorarium and a citation, which will be presented at a ceremony arranged by the co-sponsors in June 2006.

The winning mentor will be selected for his or her efforts in supporting the work and developing the careers of younger staff. Examples of typical mentoring activities include:

- Advising junior staff to help them create career opportunities, networking skills, and contacts for growth and development;
- Counseling junior staff and providing resources to help develop their technical writing, analysis, presentation and organizational skills and knowledge;
- Encouraging junior staff growth and career development through attendance and oral presentations at meetings with higher level officials, staffs of other agencies, professional associations, training courses, and conferences;
- Motivating junior staff and building self confidence through feedback on their efforts, being a listener when that is needed, and creating a caring and supportive environment; -
- Serving as a role model for junior staff through professional expertise, information and insights, balancing collegial and personal roles, and including everyone across rank, race, ethnicity, and seniority.

PRIVACY IN STATISTICAL DATABASES'2006 (PSD'2006) -- CALL FOR PAPERS

1. AIMS AND GOALS

Privacy in statistical databases is about finding tradeoffs to the tension between the increasing societal and economical demand for accurate information and the legal and ethical obligation to protect the privacy of individuals and enterprises which are the source of the statistical data. To put it bluntly, statistical agencies cannot expect to collect accurate information from individual or corporate respondents unless these feel the privacy of their responses is guaranteed; also, recent surveys of web users show that a majority of these are unwilling to provide data to a web site unless they know that privacy protection measures are in place.

"Privacy in Statistical Databases'2006" (PSD'2006) is the main conference of the CENEX-SDC project funded by Eurostat and will be used to raise the awareness of SDC in Europe and beyond. PSD'2006 is regarded as a successor of PSD'2004 (http://vneumann.etse.urv.es/psd2004), the final conference of the CASC project (IST-2000-25069), held in Barcelona on June 9-11, 2004, and with proceedings published in Springer LNCS vol. 3050. Those two PSD conferences follow a tradition of high-quality technical conferences on SDC which started with "Statistical Data Protection-SDP'98," held in Lisbon in 1998 and with proceedings published by OPOCE, and continued with the AMRADS project SDC Workshop, held in Luxemburg in 2001 and with proceedings published in Springer LNCS vol. 2316.

Like the aforementioned preceding conferences, PSD'2006 originates at the EU, but wishes to stay a worldwide event in SDC. Thus, contributions and attendees from overseas are welcome.

4. SUBMISSIONS

Both original technical contributions and high-quality surveys on the above topics or on related topics are sought. A submission should be clearly marked either as an original paper or a survey. Submissions should contain a cover letter indicating:

- 1) whether the submission is a survey or an original contribution;
- 2) the title of the submission;
- 3) keywords classifying the paper topic;
- 4) the names and affiliations of authors;
- 5) the e-mail, telephone and facsimile numbers of the contact author.

The submission itself should be sent as an attached PDF file. Submission and their cover letters should be sent to: psd2006@urv.net.

Camera-ready versions of accepted papers should be prepared using the LaTeX2e style or the Word template of Springer Verlag Lecture Notes in Computer Science. For LaTeX2e, a macro package (Ilncs.zip) and an example file (typeinst.zip) can be downloaded from http://www.springeronline.com/sgw/cda/frontpage/0,10735,5-164-2-72376-0,00.html

For Microsoft Word, a template (word.zip) can be downloaded from the same page above.

We encourage authors to use the above formats already for their submissions.

LENGTH OF SUBMISSIONS

Using the above format with 11 point font, the paper should be at most 12 pages excluding bibliography and appendices, and at most 16 pages total. Committee members are not required to read appendices; the paper should be intelligible without them. Submissions not meeting these guidelines risk rejection without consideration of their merits.

5. PROCEEDINGS

Among PSD'2006 accepted papers, a selection will be made based on quality and coverage and the selected papers will be published in the Lecture Notes in Computer Science (LNCS) series by Springer. This follows the tradition of PSD'2004 (LNCS 3050) and the AMRADS Workshop on SDC (LNCS 2316). The remaining accepted papers will be published in a CD with an ISBN. It is possible to submit a paper directly for the CD, which benefits from a later submission deadline (see CD-only dates below).

The form of publication of an accepted paper will be clearly specified in the acceptance message. Both the LNCS volume and the CD will be *available at the conference*.
