Did you know

TSHS uses a 3-year chair system. Though each person only serves one year as chair of the section, he or she is actually accepting a three year commitment when elected – chair-elect, chair, and past-chair. Paraphrasing from the <u>TSHS charter</u>, here are the roles and responsibilities for these three years:

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## Report from the Secretary/ Treasurer

Following is a brief summary of the March, April, and June TSHS executive committee meetings (conference calls). Note that no meeting was held in May.

Topics discussed during the **March 20 meeting** included the following: an update on the TSHS JSM 2017 program, which will include one invited session, three topic contributed sessions, one contributed paper session, a few posters, and morning and lunch roundtable discussions; an update from the Portal Committee, during which it was noted that the committee continues to receive submissions that are to be peer reviewed and then posted to the portal; an update

on fundraising efforts, which focused primarily on efforts to obtain a sponsor for our section mixer at JSM; a discussion of the results of the pilot testing of the TSHS member survey and plans to fully implement the survey; and an update on nominations for three TSHS awards, which include the Distinguished Achievement Award, the Outstanding Teaching Award, and the Young Investigator Award.

Topics discussed during the **April 17 meeting** included the following: an update from the Promoting Promotions Committee – a new proposed benefit of TSHS membership will be that some senior faculty members who are also TSHS members will offer to assist junior faculty members who are also TSHS members with their promotion packets; an update from the Portal Committee, during which it was noted that there are now 6 datasets available on the Portal; an update on fundraising efforts; an update on the TSHS member survey, which was already sent out, and for which the closing date for responses was May 15; an update on TSHS awards; a discussion about book reviews for the TSHS newsletter, which was then broadened into a discussion of the development of resources that would be potentially helpful to TSHS members and the dissemination of these resources; and an update on JSM 2017 business, which included discussions on sharing (and staffing) an information table with the Statistical Education section, and on any equipment that would be needed for the section business meeting.

Topics discussed during the **June 19 meeting** included the following: an announcement that Amy Nowacki was elected as TSHS Chair-Elect-Elect (Chair-Elect in 2018, Chair in 2019, and Past Chair in 2020); an update on the search for TSHS Program

a polar area display.


