Business Meeting

Chapter President, Earl Becker, brought the annual business meeting to order the afternoon of June 26, 1996. Allen Bingham, Chapter Secretary/Treasurer gave a report on the 1995 Business Meeting minutes, and the status of the treasury at the time of the meeting (an updated treasury report is provided in a later section of this newsletter).

Video Short Course-National ASA Plans: Earl Becker summarized the current status of plans by the national organization to tape two separate short courses at the 1996 Joint statistical meetings in Chicago.

Chapter Service Recognition Award: Earl Becker announced that Hal Geiger was chosen as our chapter's nominee for the ASA's Chapter Service Recognition Award as previously announced in our [June 1996 Newsletter](#).

Election of Officers: **Mark Udevitz**, National Biological Service, Alaska Science Center, Anchorage was elected Vice-President for 1997. **Ron Barry**, current Vice-President will become President. **Bob Sutherland**, Master's student at University of

Alaska, Fairbanks was elected as an executive committee member for 1997. **Allen Bingham**, Division of Sport Fish, Alaska Department of Fish and Game, Anchorage will serve his second year of a two-year term as Secretary/Treasurer. **Jay Ver Hoef** will serve his second year of a three-year term as our representative to the Council of Chapters. Terms will begin in January 1997.

Quantitative Literacy: Earl Becker, Jay Ver Hoef, and other Chapter members discussed the issues of our chapter and the national ASA's quantitative literacy (QL) program to outreach to elementary and secondary educational institutions in Alaska. June Morita, chairperson of the Washington state ASA chapter's committee on QL presented some further suggestions on how to make our efforts more effective. OTHER ITEMS OF INTEREST

Reports on the 1996 Joint Statistical Meetings in Chicago, Illinois

Chapter President's Report

According to the program, there were 37 different CE courses offered at the National Statistical meeting in Chicago, of which 2 were video-taped. ASA scheduled the following 2 courses to be taped: "**An Introduction to Regression Graphics**" by R. Dennis Cook and Sanford Weisberg, and "**Bayes and Empirical Bayes Methods for Biostatistical Data Analysis**" by Bradley Carlin and Thomas Louis. In order to reduce the cost of making the tapes, ASA decided to use 1 video-camera per course. They had contracted with a video expert in the Washington D.C. area, unfortunately, his video equipment was stolen right before he left for Chicago. He rented some equipment in order to tape the above 2 courses, unfortunately, there was an equipment malfunction during the Regression course and only an audio tape is available. The equipment problem was fixed by using another camera for the second course, which was taped without incident. In order to obtain 2 CE tapes, ASA decided to tape another short-course, and picked: "**Overview of Applied Reliability**" by Larry Leemis. Since ASA only had 1 camera and camera man, they were limited to taping only 1 full-day-course per day. Full day courses were offered during 4 days of the conference, so there is some room for ASA to expand the number of courses taped per meeting.

I had the opportunity to talk to a number of ASA officers about the Chapter's concerns relative to taping short-courses, the officers include: Ray Waller (Executive Director), Lynne Billard (ASA President), David Hoaglin (ASA Vice-President), Janet Buckingham (ASA CE committee), June Morita (NW Council of Chapter Rep), Cathy Crocker (ASA staff - Director of Education), and Sue Kulesher (ASA staff - CE specialist), I also made contact with several ex-Presidents of ASA (Bob Hogg, Carl Morris, Ron Iman, and Katherine Wallman). In all of my conversations dealing with taping of CE courses, I first and foremost thanked them on behalf of the Chapter for reinstitution taping of the short-courses, and made a plug for them to tape short-courses next year and hopefully expand the number of courses taped in the future.

I also attended the "***Isolated Statisticians***" meeting and found out that I am "not an isolated statistician". This group consists mainly of statisticians who are the only statisticians in the Math Dept. of a Liberal Arts College. In the discussion, at which ASA Executive-Director, Ray Waller, was present, the cost of the continuing education courses offered at the national meetings came up. Apparently, some of these individuals can not obtain funding to attend the courses and they are too expensive to attend on their own. I mentioned that taping ASA courses and then viewing them at Chapter meetings could be done at a reasonable cost.

The other meeting I attended was on ***Applied Statisticians***, this was an open meeting containing members of this new committee. The formation of this group is ASA's attempt to find out from the Applied Statisticians what services and needs the organization needs to address. I think a tremendous amount of good can come out of this committee if they are constructive. Meredith Warsaw is the chair, and she is interested in hearing about what services applied statisticians want from ASA. So if you have an opinion that you would like to share with this group you can contact Meredith at 698 Hartford St., Newton Heights, MA 02161, or e-mail mwarshaw@tiac.net. Again at this meeting I brought up the taping of short-courses at the national meeting.

It was my understanding that ASA intends to tape some courses at next years meeting and that they might elicit feedback from the Alaska Chapter as to which courses to tape. There are some well known speakers who prefer not to be taped because they feel it hinders their ability to teach the class.

I also attended the Council of Chapter's Workshop and Reception with Jay Ver Hoef. Jay and I decided that we should document how to deal with ASA. We felt that if the Chapter had a paper explaining how ASA decisions are made and what committees and processes influence decisions, Chapter officers could become more effective in communicating our needs to the ASA.

Chapter Representative Report

During the meetings, I presented the paper, "*Spatio-temporal Prediction of Snow Depth for Caribou Winter Range*," by myself and Ron Barry. I also attended many technical sessions and attended the Council of Chapters business meeting and workshop (see below).

The sessions I attended included:

- Advances in Statistical Climate Modeling and Analysis
- Environmental Monitoring
- Bayesian Shrinkage
- Spatial Statistics and Imaging Problems
- Space and Time in Ecology: Data, Models, and Inference
- Environmental and Ecological Statistics
- Random Effects Models: Bayesian Approaches
- Spatial Statistics in the Environmental Sciences
- Inference for Deterministic Simulation Models
- Statistical Assessment of Environmental Monitoring in the United States

I also attended the annual Council of Chapters business meeting on August 7 at the Joint Statistical meetings of the ASA in Chicago. After a brief introduction by Marlene Egger, we were addressed by ASA President-Elect Jon Kettenring. The ASA has begun to do strategic planning for some possible restructuring. If anyone has ideas about this, they can contact Jon Kettenring. We were also reminded that ASA does have a visiting statistician program. If we would like one of the officers of ASA to visit us, we must contact Nancy Hiett.

Marlene Egger led a discussion of the frequency of the Chapter Recognition Award. Presently, one award is given to a Chapter every 5 years. Some chapters expressed the wish to give it more often, or perhaps several awards every 5 years. Others expressed concern that this would dilute the value of the award. If you have any ideas or concerns on this matter, please contact Jay Ver Hoef, and he will forward them to the appropriate officers. **During the meeting, Hal Geiger was given the Chapter Recognition award, and it was received by Jay Ver Hoef in Hal's absence.**

On the computer front, we were warned about using our Chapter Homepage and hotlinks. Apparently, the use of some hotlinks may jeopardize our tax status. The ASA was going to look into this more carefully, and hopefully there will be more information in the future. Uwe Koehn, the Council of Chapters Chair-elect, is starting a committee on the World Wide Web and its use to ASA chapters. Finally, note that the ASA membership is now on-line. Everyone is encouraged to check to make sure

the information is accurate, or, if you wish to be removed from the list, you must contact them.

During the Council of Chapters business meeting, there was an hour long tutorial on creating homepages using HTML language. During the second half of the meeting, I attended a roundtable discussion of the Traveling Course. The pilot Traveling Course was a new initiative by the ASA Council of Chapters, conceptualized at the January, 1995 COCGB meeting. Designed as a service to chapter members, particularly applied statisticians at the Masters level, the course was intended to attract speakers of national caliber and to achieve a cost savings by offering the same course at several chapters in a limited geographical region. The intent was to be low-cost to chapter members. A committee was formed from COC members (including myself) who had expressed interest in the course. A WWW homepage for the Traveling Course was created by the Alaska Chapter in December and continuously updated during this time. Survey responses were posted there to help chapters with common interests coordinate with each other. Two potential speakers were able and willing to offer a course in the limited time frame: Michael Kutner ("Logistic Regression"), and J. Stuart Hunter ("Beyond the Shewhart Paradigm".) These offerings were announced to the chapters. Approximately one quarter of ASA chapters responded, expressing considerable interest in one or both offerings. The traveling course committee actively facilitated proposals for trios of chapters to receive one or the other course. Five such trios were put forward to the COC Governing Board, which then voted to give Michael Kutner's "Logistic Regression" to Central Illinois Chapter, Central Indiana Chapter, and Chicago Chapter during the first week in June. The cost was kept to about \$25/person for a 1/2 day course. There will be an attempt to have 2, or possibly 3 trios of chapters give this a try. Also, they may try to videotape courses for really remote chapters. (Like us!) We shall try to get a course to come to Alaska this year. I will keep the Chapter informed about courses and dates.

Applications of Recruitment Models to Fisheries Data

The Alaska Chapter of the American Fisheries Society is sponsoring a workshop on **Applications of Recruitment Models to Fisheries Data** on September 30 - October 4, 1996 in Anchorage, Alaska. The workshop will be taught by Dr. James P. Geaghan and Dr. E. Barry Moser, faculty members from the Department of Experimental Statistics, Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The objectives of the short course are to serve as a refresher on fisheries applications of recruitment models. In addition to the classic models such as those of Ricker and Beverton and Holt, applications of Beverton and Holt's Yield per Recruit model will also be

discussed. Another objective of the course is to review Virtual Population and Cohort Analysis. Applications of these techniques, including estimation of recruitment will be discussed. Both instructors have advanced degrees in fisheries or wildlife sciences and are adept at relating statistical concepts to field and laboratory applications. There should be ample time for interactive discussions.

Registration fees for the workshop are \$250.00 for AFS members and \$275.00 for non-members. The workshop will be held in the Comfort Inn in downtown Anchorage. The hotel has offered our group excellent lodging rates at \$55 (single or double) per night. Class size is limited to 35 people; registrants will be accepted on a first-come/first-serve basis. At least 20 registrants are needed by September 5 to ensure this workshop offering.

Public Statistics Day Counts in Chicago

What happened when 16 statisticians met 160 students at the first Public Statistics Day in Chicago on August 2?

Students enjoyed the morning, and instructors experienced the satisfaction of having shared their expertise with groups of youngsters who might otherwise never have

had the opportunity to learn about statistics from professionals in the field. The young people in grades 4, 6, 8 and high school certainly would not have had the opportunity to travel from their summer schools to the Hyatt Regency, which graciously provided space and a refreshment break.

In addition to the Hyatt, CNA Insurance Companies, Eli Lilly, GM Research and Development Center, Merck Laboratories and Wyeth-Ayerst Research contributed financially to mini conference costs, which included students' transportation, audio visual rental, and other expenses.

The day featured presentations on a variety of subjects, ranging from "Counting M&Ms" to "Exploring Statistics in the Sports, Music and Auto Industries."

In the feedback meeting which followed, statisticians agreed that those sessions which encouraged students' active involvement, such as Roxy Peck's "How Many Chocolate Chips Are There in a Chocolate Chip Cookie?" were most effective. (The little ones voted that California cookies, baked by the teacher, were best!) All agreed that their time was well spent and the students attentive. They expressed enthusiasm for the concept and indicated they would do it again.

Plans are already underway to repeat Public Statistics Day in Anaheim, and ASA hopes the event will become a tradition at JSM.
