Toolbox Tips: Building Trust in Informatics

Trust is the foundation of successful informatics work. Without it, even the best solutions fall flat. Here's how to intentionally build and sustain trust with our clinical partners:

• Show up, don't just show slides Be present. Face time matters more than a polished presentation.

• Speak their language

Avoid IT jargon. Translate problems and solutions into terms that align with patient care, safety, and efficiency.

• Don't defend broken systems If something doesn't work well, acknowledge it. Then shift to "Here's what we can do about it."

Follow up—every time

Even if there's no update yet, clinicians will trust you more if you close the loop consistently.

Bring data, not opinions

Show the before and after. A 30% reduction in clicks speaks louder than "I think this is better."

· Celebrate quick wins

Small improvements build momentum. Don't wait for the perfect fix—highlight progress.

Field Notes: Fixing Sepsis Alerts That Were Wasting Everyone's Time

"Nurses were overloaded. Physicians stopped trusting the system. Sepsis alerts were failing."

That's when our informatics team stepped in.

What We Did:

The local clinical informatics team led a targeted initiative to redesign the alert logic. Their approach was grounded in real-world insights and clinical collaboration:

- Shadowed frontline workflows to understand how alerts were being experienced in practice.
- Analyzed real-time alert and response data to assess sensitivity, specificity, and timing.
- Facilitated cross-disciplinary sessions with nursing, providers, and IT to align on clinical relevance and feasibility.
- Proposed changes to clinical decision support rules—without requiring a major EHR rebuild—to fine-tune alert criteria.

The Impact:

- ▼ 42% decrease in sepsis alert volume, reducing noise across clinical roles.
- Restored clinician confidence, with users reporting the alerts were more meaningful and actionable.

Key Takeaways for Clinical Informaticists:

- Start with the frontline experience.
 Observing real workflows helps uncover gaps that data alone may miss.
- Use data to build credibility. Alert analysis provided a shared foundation to drive consensus among stakeholders.
- Small changes can have big impact.
 Optimizing existing logic—without overhauling the system—led to rapid, sustainable improvement.
- Collaboration is key. Engaging users in the redesign process built ownership and trust in the revised tool.
