Current Trends in MSR Research

The Spiritual Infrastructure of the Future as an Area of Research

In the book, *Redefining Spiritual Spaces in the Age of Technology: Innovations and Pitfalls* (Springer, 2025), the editors and contributors lay out an emerging spiritual infrastructure, an area rife with research potential. Through many contributors, this infrastructure is found as a distributed, interwoven aspect of society. Spiritual space is no longer limited to churches, mosques, and temples, but instead, is found among spiritual explorers who are less interested in religiosity and more interested in experiencing the divine. It is in small groups, both in person and virtual, within all kinds of public and private social enterprises, and more of a grassroots phenomenon absent a guru, priest, or spiritual leader.

Although the book focuses on the philosophical and practical application of technologies in creating new, virtual spiritual spaces, several chapters are built upon research. Those chapters include Pergament and Pomerleau's chapter on experiencing the sacred, Campbell's chapter on digital religion, Guenther's chapter on virtual sacred circles, Akmal et al.'s chapter on chaplain conversation circles, and Cadge's epilogue on the spiritual infrastructure of the future.

The volume includes contributions from a wide range of scholars and practitioners, including Krista Tippett, Richard J. Davidson, Kenneth Pargament, Heidi A. Campbell, Linda Lantieri, and Wendy Cadge. Several MSR members contributed:

- Judi Neal is the first chapter after the Introduction in the book. Her chapter is titled, "Global Consciousness and the Power of Virtual Spaces".
- Stacey Guenther contributed chapter 8, called, "Virtual Sacred Circles: The Rise of Spiritual Exploration in Small Groups".
- Techia Smalls-Brown co-wrote an article about racial healing circles called, "Virtual Healing Experiences in a Dual Pandemic."
- Helen Chung was a contributor to a chapter on chaplaincy conversation circles called, "The Conversation Circles: A Sacred Space of Healing".
- And Meena Srinivasan co-wrote a chapter about the Transformative Leadership Education program called, "Creating Transformative Experiences Through Virtual Sacred Space".

Mapping Spiritual Awakening: Diverse Journeys of Consciousness Expansion: December 15, 11:00am-12:30pm Eastern Time

This **90-min research webinar** is organized by the **MSR Research Committee** (Tianyuan Yu, Naida Culshaw, Stacey Guenther, Konstantin Weicht, and Gaëtan Mourmant) and will be co-hosted by Tianyuan Yu (Mount Saint Vincent University, Canada) and Gaëtan Mourmant (Business Science Institute, France). This event marks the first in a **series of MSR research webinars** to be held from **December 2025 through June 2026**. The Committee intends to offer future webinars at varying times of day to ensure participants in different time zones have equitable opportunities to join. This webinar builds on a two-year in-depth dialogue on the role of suffering in spiritual awakening as a focal phenomenon of spiritual leadership. It shares early findings from a grounded-theory typology that explores diverse and empowering pathways to consciousness expansion. Drawing on first-person narratives, literature, and spiritual traditions, the session will highlight key themes such as triggers, letting go, joy, suffering, human agency, and spiralling cycles of growth. The session will also invite participants to share their own experiences and reflections on spiritual awakening.
