# **Leadership Highlights**

## **Highlights from Chapter Leader Day 2024**

Approximately 100-chapter leaders convened in San Antonio, Texas for Chapter Leader Day 2024. The primary goal of the event was to allow all participants, including the Member Engagement Committee (MEC) and APIC staff, to connect around the discovery and creation of solutions that will advance our local chapters and chapter leaders. Over the course of the event participants learned about existing leadership resources and then worked together to review and update the current job descriptions, create role-specific tips and tricks, and ideate new resources to fill any remaining leadership information or resource gaps. They also provided the MEC with real-time feedback on several key chapter programs and ideas on how to make them better.

One of the most popular activities of the day was the Chapter Leader Resource Bingo Game. The game was designed as a fun way to inform and test the leaders' knowledge while increasing awareness of the resources that APIC provides to support chapter leaders. #### IPUs available for chapter participation and volunteerism

It has been said by many chapter leaders that chapter leadership and local participation can be a rewarding experience providing opportunities to enhance personal, organizational and professional networks and developmental pathways. In serving as a chapter leader, you gain a depth of experience and access to information and resources that help advance your leadership journey locally, within APIC, and in the field.

One of the specific benefits attached to local chapter participation is the award of IPUs. Infection prevention units (IPUs) are unique to CBIC and can be converted from CNEs or CEUs according to CBIC's specified conversion scale ( .1 CEU = 1 IPU and 1 CNE= 1 IPU.) However, in order for CNE or CEU's to be converted to IPUs, they must be attached to educational content that is IPC related and related to the content domains for CIC.

In addition to obtaining IPU's for local education, chapter members can also get IPUs by serving in local leadership positions, including elected office, director roles or on committees. IPUs can also be awarded to candidates for speaking at local meetings and conferences.

When preparing one's portfolio, it's important to note that half of the IPUs in a candidate's portfolio must be from an accredited provider. The other half must be from a credible provider, but don't necessarily have to be accredited. This means the candidates can obtain IPUs for chapter level activity, including local education, even if/when no CE is offered for it.

CBIC's IPU Criteria chart, a two-page chart that details the eligible activities and criteria for IPU eligibility, is housed on the CBIC website and can be a helpful tool in understanding and sharing how members can obtain IPUs via local chapter participation.

## Call for Chapter Participation in IP Burn Out Study

APIC is looking for local chapters to participate in a study on burnout among Infection Preventionists. In 2023, an AJIC study highlighted the impact that COVID-19 had on Infection Preventionist's mental and physical health. The study showed a significant number of respondents that reported notable levels of depression (21.5%), anxiety (29.8%), and burnout (65.2%), and that workplaces with shorter shifts and adequate wellness support were associated with better health outcomes (Melnyk et. al, 2023).

Our hypothesis is that issues such as substantial job expectations coupled with inadequate staffing can lead to higher stress levels, lower productivity, and other less than favorable mental health outcomes. The hope is that this study will allow Infection Preventionists and their employers to seek solutions that improve their quality of life at work and enhance the care that their communities receive. Interested chapters will be invited to attend a presentation that will outline the timeline of the study, study aims, and preliminary findings.
