How it got started:

During the early Fall of 1954, Dr. James Potter, Chairman of the Department of Physics at Texas A and M University, Dr. Newton Gaines, Chairman of the Department of Physics at Texas Christian University, and Dr. Herbert C. Schwetman, Chairman of the Department of Physics at Baylor University, met at the National Science Education Conference at Lake Texoma (at the suggestion of Dr. Potter) and discussed the possibility of starting the Texas Section of the A. A. P. T..

Concerning the Texas Academy of Science:

Prior to the formation of the Texas AAPT, the membership and the meetings of the Texas Academy of Science were strongly oriented toward the biological and earth sciences. Participation in Academy affairs, including meetings, by chemists, mathematicians, and physicists was meager, with the result that all three areas shared one Section of the Academy and held joint sessions at the meetings, a fact which obviously had an adverse effect on any attempts to increase interest in the meetings. The success of the Texas AAPT in stimulating interest and activity in physics in the years following 1954 appears to have motivated some members of the Texas Section of the Mathematical Association of America to follow a similar approach to increased activity in mathematics in the Academy meetings, and by 1961 the activity in both fields was sufficient to cause the Academy to create separate sections, with Section I designated for mathematics and Section II for physical sciences. 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The first organizational meeting of the Texas Section of the A.A.P.T. was held on Saturday, December 11, 1954 at San Antonio College, San Antonio, Texas. The group of 25 physics teachers from high schools, junior colleges, and universities was called to order by Dr. Potter, who then presided over the election of a temporary chairman. Dr. Potter was elected by acclamation and appointed Dr. H. M. Moseley of Texas Christian University as temporary secretary.

Dr. Potter announced that the plan to organize a Texas Section of the A.A.P.T. to meet annually with the Texas Academy of Science had already received the endorsement of the Executive Councils of both the Texas Academy of Science and the American Association of Physics Teachers. A letter from the Executive Council of the A.A.P.T. endorsing the plan was read by the chairman.

Petition sheets reading "We, the undersigned, respectfully petition the Council for the authority to organize a Texas Section of the American Association of Physics Teachers" were then circulated for signatures; a total of 25 signatures were obtained.

It was then moved: That the next meeting of the Texas Section of the A.A.P.T. be on the occasion of the 1955 meeting of the Texas Academy of Science, and that a program be presented at that time. The motion carried unanimously.

During the period since its founding in 1954, the Texas Section has served the physics community through a variety of activities, including:

- It has sponsored meetings in all parts of the state where ideas concerning physics and physics teaching have been shared and exchanged.
- It has provided an opportunity for faculty members and students of the colleges and universities to report on the physics research being carried on in Texas.
- It has afforded a common meeting ground for physics teachers from all levels--university, college, junior

It would be inappropriate in this brief history to describe each of these activities in detail. However, concerning item #2, it is believed that the importance of the Texas Section in providing a regional forum for research in physics merits further comment. The only other organization which has sponsored broadspectrum meetings has been the American Physical Society, but it has not provided meetings of reasonable proximity on an annual basis, and in recent years meetings in Texas or in any of the adjoining states have become guite rare. Records indicate that in the fifteen years 1956-70 inclusive, eleven national APS meetings were held in Texas or in adjoining states (Houston-3, Austin-3, Norman-2, Dallas-1, Los Alamos-1, and New Orleans-1), or an average of 0.73 per year. During the six years 1971-76, however, the only meeting in the five-state area was in Albuquerque in June 1972, giving an average for the six years of 0.17 meeting per year. With institutional travel funds limited, the professional meetings sponsored by Texas Section AAPT have become increasingly important.

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November 13, 1981 Organization Meeting

MINUTES MEETING TO DISCUSS ORGANIZATION OF THE TEXAS SECTION OF THE AMERICAN PHYSICAL SOCIETY

MEETING HELD AT TCU ON NOVEMBER 13, 1981, AT 2:00 P.M.

- Robert Clark (who has worked with David Gavenda and Len Diana) opened discussion by pointing out several advantages to formation of Texas Section of APS.
 - a) Increases in research papers in TSAAPT indicate a need for involvement with research oriented organization.
 - b) Rise in travel cost and decrease in availability of funds would imply need for more localized meeting.
 - c) Abstracts would appear in APS Bulletin.
 - d) W. W. Havens of APS is enthusiastic there are 851 Texas members.
- It was suggested by Robert Clark that the traditional Fall TSAAPT Meeting be in conjunction with the proposed TSAPS.

November 13, 1981 Organization Meeting

- Robert Clark read Article 9 of APS Constitution on the establishment of a section and suggested we should:
 - a) elect temporary chairman
 - b) discuss appropriateness
 - c) form an organization committee.
- 4. Robert Clark was elected <u>temporary</u> chairman James Crawford was elected <u>temporary</u> secretary
- Concern was expressed by David Blackstock and others that inclusion of TSAPS with TSAAPT Fall Meeting might change the nature of the existing fall meeting.
- 6. David Gavenda pointed out that with the increased emphasis on research and with abstracts appearing in the APS Bulletin we should get both a wider spectrum of people and more participation.

November 13, 1981 Organization Meeting

- 7. Max Bolen commented that the association between the research community and teaching community would be an intellectually healthy one.
- 8. C. E. Hathaway commented the TSAAPT is strong and should show leadership in the formation of TSAPS. Bringing the two organizations together such as with the fall meeting can't hurt us.
- 9. It was suggested that we collect information on how many joint members (APS and AAPT) there are in Texas.
- 10. C. A. Quarles pointed out that we should avoid any schism within the proposed joint meetings. Possibly have all abstracts published in APS Bulletin. We should not model our meeting after the AAPT-APS Winter Meeting.
- Jack Wilson made a motion to form the Texas Section of the American Physical Society. The motion was seconded.

Discussion: Herb Schwetman commented that the expected increase in size will limit places in Texas where we can meet. Ed LeMaster suggested TSAPS might meet with TAS in the Spring instead of the Fall TSAAPT.

The vote was 21 in favor of formation of the Texas Section of the American Physical Society, none opposed with one abstention.

Diana March 10, 1982 Memo to Gavenda, Hudson, Quarles

I saw Dr. W. W. Havens, Jr., Executive Secretary of APS, shortly before 9:30 a.m., Sunday, March 7, 1982, and he put the matter of the Texas Section, APS, on the agenda of the Executive Committee of the APS for discussion at 2:30 p.m.

I presented our case at 2:30 p.m. and the motion to approve the Texas Section, APS, passed without dissenting vote. I assume the vote was unanimous; Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, in the chair, did not ask about abstentions.

Minutes of the First Meeting of the Texas Section

Austin, Texas; 11–13 November 1982

PREAMBLE

The inaugural meeting of the Texas Section of the American Physical Society was held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin on 11-13 November 1982. J. David Gavenda served as the local chairperson and the APS Council was represented by Mildred S. Dresselhaus, APS Vice-President, who announced that the Texas Section and its bylaws had been formally approved by the Council. Two hundred and eighty-nine individuals registered for the meeting which was held jointly with the Texas Section of the American Association of Physics Teachers and Zone 10 of the Society of Physics Students. John L. Hubisz of College of the Mainland served as the program chairperson.

The program featured invited presentations by Joe P. Meyer, AAPT Vice-President; Edward S. Fry, Texas A&M University; and K. W. Gentle, J. D. Meiss, and Steven Weinberg of the University of Texas at Austin. Ninety-four contributed papers were presented in nine sessions during the meeting. The luncheon speakers were Mildred Dresselhaus and Dion Shea of SPS. The banquet speaker was Harlan J. Smith, Director of McDonald Observatory and a special award was presented to Herbert D. Schwetman, Baylor University (retired) for outstanding contributions to physics in higher education in Texas. The program also included laboratory tours and exhibits.

A business meeting, following the luncheon, was presided over by Leonard M. Diana of the University of Texas at Arlington who served as the chairperson of the section organizing committee. Mildred Dresselhaus announced that the APS Council had approved a \$1000 contribution to the section to assist with organizational expenses and presented a check to Len Diana. She also discussed the important role of sections and explained the recently approved Council policy which allows APS members to join a section at no cost and provides a \$2.00 contribution per member to the section from APS.

The following were elected as interim section officers to serve until the election in the Spring of 1983. Leonard M. Diana, Chairperson; J. David Gavenda, Vice-chairperson and Robert Beck Clark, Texas A&M University, as Secretary-Treasurer. Elected to serve on the interim section executive board were Charles K. Manka, Sam Houston State University; Bowen Loftin, University of Houston-Downtown Campus; Rogers W. Redding, North Texas State University; Ben M. Doughty, East Texas State University; and Thomas L. Estle, Rice University.

Motions were also passed unanimously that the section would hold its fall and spring meetings jointly with the Texas Section of AAPT. The spring section meeting for 1983 will therefore be held 3-5 March at Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches and the fall 1983 meeting will be held 17-19 November at North Texas State University in Denton. David Gavenda also reported on the setting of fees for abstracts to appear in the *Bulletin* at \$7.00 per abstract.

- The Texas Section was welcomed by Tom Callaway. He outlined some particulars of social functions as well as other items of special interest.
- Virginia Rawlins reported that 26 AAPT papers and 12 APS papers were to be presented along with Dr. Alexander's special talk on "Mission to Haley's Comet."
- 3. The fall 1983 meeting will be held November 17-19 at North Texas State. All meeting rooms will be in the Physics Building as classes will be dismissed. The Holiday Inn will be the headquarters hotel. October 1, 1983 will be the deadline for AAPT papers. APS deadline will be October 21, 1983. There will be a chairman's breakfast at the Student Union. There will be another running of the Microprocessor workshop. (\$50 fee sent to James R. Crawford, Physics Dept., SWTSU, San Marcos, TX 78666). A request from U.T. at Arlington was made for a symposium discussing exemplary laboratory programs.
- 4. The National APS-AAPT meeting is to be in San Antonio, January 30 through February 2, 1984. The National AAPT office requested the TSAAPT have their spring meeting in conjunction with the National meeting in San Antonio. Discussion followed. Motion made, seconded, and passed unanimously to do so.
- Tom O'Kuma reported everything going fine in preparation for the 1984 fall meeting at San Jacinto Jr. College, November 15-17.
- 6. Dick Bartels reported on progress in national legislation to alleviate teacher problems. He also reported Tim Ingoldsby is leaving and a replacement is needed for staff physicist at the National office. We were reminded of the summer meeting being held in Memphis, June 15-18. The 1984 summer meeting will be at the University of Maryland. The 1985 winter meeting will be at Toronto, Canada. The 1985 summer meeting will be at Flagstaff, Arizona. CAST will meet at Trinity University, November, 27-29, 1983.
- 7. Jack Wilson's letter of apology for not attending this meeting was read.
- 8. Len Diana (or possibly Robert Clark) proposed that the fall meeting with TSAPS be run by TSAAPT with a vice-chairperson from TSAPS and the the proceeds from the meeting go to TSAAPT. The spring meeting would be run by TSAPS with a vice-chairperson from TSAAPT with the proceeds going to TSAPS. Motion made and passed unanimously.
