Legislative Symposium



- How YOU can make a difference and let your voice be heard!

As medical laboratory professionals, many of us know that the work we do is more of a "behind-the-scenes" type of career. Many times, laboratories are out of sight of the public and even other healthcare professionals and as such, we often find ourselves saying that no one knows who we are or what we do. Maybe you feel that because of this, we don't have a say in decisions affecting our work or that our voices are neglected because we are not always recognized as an important part of the healthcare team. But I'm here to tell you of a great way to not only shed light on our profession, but to have your voice heard and make an impact on the legislative decisions that affect medical laboratory scientists as a whole. And the best part? You don't even have to leave your home!

I'm talking about the Laboratory Legislative Symposium. If you haven't heard of it, allow me to give you some background information. This two-day event is held in Washington, D. C. every year and is a coming together of laboratory professionals from ASCLS, the American Society for Clinical Pathology (ASCP), the American Medical Technologists (AMT), the Association of Genetic Technologists (AGT), the National Society for Histotechnology (NSH), and the Philippine Association of Medical Technologists-USA (PAMET-USA). Attendees spend the first day learning about lobbying and how to do it. They are given information on current legislature that could affect our profession and educated on how to discuss it with their congressional representatives. In addition, they are also given information to leave with the legislative staff. By the end of the day, they leave feeling prepared to meet with their legislators on Capitol Hill the second day of the event.

"But Caitlyn, I thought you said I didn't need to leave my home!" Yes, that's true! One great aspect of the Legislative Symposium is that they offer a virtual attendee option. You'll still receive access to the same great educational sessions that those in Washington, D. C. are attending. Afterwards, you can use the provided information and schedule virtual meetings with your legislators and/or their team virtually.

"Okay but I don't really know who I would need to meet with or how to schedule anything like that myself." Allow me to help! When I attended the Legislative Symposium for the first time in 2021, it felt really overwhelming. Even though I was given a lot of great information during the educational sessions, I still wanted to see what it was like before I was able to schedule something on my own. One of the nice things for me was that other Michigan members who were meeting with their congressional representatives allowed me to sit in with them during both their in-person and virtual meetings. If you reach out to others from ASCLS-MI who plan on attending, you may be able to coordinate something together.

However, if you feel ready to take action on your own or begin reaching out to people, there are ways that you can find out who your specific legislator would be. The best way to start? Just Google it! A very quick Google search allowed me to find my congressional representatives in a matter of minutes. I was directed to



https://www.congress.gov/members/find-your-member and I was able to not only get a list of congressional members, but links to their contact information as well. And conveniently, everything to set up a meeting or contact them was online!

"So, what exactly do I get out of this?" Great question! You get to bring our profession of Medical Laboratory Science into the eyes of people who not only make decisions affecting our line of work, but who can also tell others about us as well! You get to use your voice to make a difference without having to commit an extreme amount of time or effort. You get to advocate for the needs of our profession. And you can use this information going forward time and time again. You gain confidence, skills, knowledge, and the ability to network with legislators, other ASCS members, and other laboratory professionals from other societies who are also looking to make an impact in the profession. And honestly, one of my favorite things about Legislative Symposium is knowing that I have the ability to make a difference on a national level.

And it's not just one time per year that advocacy is important. In fact, ASCLS has an entire section of their website dedicated to advocacy and issues, with multiple tabs containing excellent resources and knowledge available year-round. When you check out the ASCLS home page, make sure to hover over the tab labeled https://ascls.org/advocacy-issues/ to learn more about licensure, workforce shortages, the Political Action Committee, and more!

I don't know about you, but I tend to hear a lot of complaints from laboratory professionals about how they wish we were seen, or they wish people knew what we did, or how decisions that affect our line of work were made with no consideration for the lab itself. Knowing that, I would like to end with a quote. The following is a line from the ASCLS bulletin on August 17, 2022 regarding nursing personnel performing high complexity lab testing that I found to be highly relevant. "If you've just thought to yourself, 'someone should do something about this,' we agree. YOU are that SOMEONE."
