Rebekah E. Gee, MD, MPH

AUPHA is pleased to announce the 2019 Annual Meeting's opening keynote speaker/Pattullo Lecturer, Dr. Rebekah Gee, MD, MPH. Dr. Gee is the Secretary of the Louisiana Department of Health, the state's largest agency with a budget of \$14 billion. Her oversight responsibilities include public health and other direct service programs for citizens in need such as behavioral health, developmental disabilities, aging and adult services, emergency preparedness, and the Medicaid program. Under Dr. Gee's leadership, over 480,000 Louisianans are newly insured under Louisiana's Medicaid Expansion, and, for the first time, many are receiving much needed primary and preventive health care.

Dr. Gee is an Obstetrician/Gynecologist and brings a caregivers' perspective to the people she serves. She is also a trained policy expert who has served in numerous state and national policy roles and in 2017 she was elected to the National Academy of Medicine. Prior to her role as Secretary, Dr. Gee served as the director for the Birth Outcomes Initiative where she led the charge to decrease infant mortality and prematurity statewide – an effort that in part led to a 25% reduction in infant mortality, an 85% drop in elective deliveries before 39 weeks, and a 10% drop in NICU admissions statewide.

She is the mother of five energetic children and lives in New Orleans where she continues to see patients.

President and CEO, Federation of American Hospitals



Charles N. (Chip) Kahn, III, has served as President and CEO of the Federation of American Hospitals, the national advocacy organization for investor-owned hospitals, since 2001. Mr. Kahn's extensive health policy expertise, outstanding leadership abilities, lengthy Capitol Hill experience, and proven campaign and communications skills make him one of Washington, DC's most effective and accomplished trade association executives.

Mr. Kahn is one of only three health care leaders who have appeared on Modern Healthcare magazine's annual "100 Most Influential People in Healthcare" list (formerly the "100 Most Powerful People in Healthcare" list) since its inception. In 2016, the magazine credited him with helping shape health care policy and said he is at the "forefront of change."

In December 2018, The Hill newspaper selected Mr. Kahn as one of the capital's top lobbyists for the 18th consecutive year. Becker's Hospital Review also included Mr. Kahn on its "50 Most Powerful People in Healthcare" list for 2015. He also appeared on the list in 2014, 2012, 2011, 2010, and 2009. Fortune magazine, for three consecutive years, named the former Health Insurance Association of America (HIAA), under Mr. Kahn's leadership, as the nation's most influential insurance trade association.

TOUR NEW ORLEANS

TUESDAY, JUNE 11, 2:00 – 4:30PM

Immerse yourself in the culture, history, and landscape of vibrant New Orleans on this city-wide tour. This experience combines elements from several disparate tours, including those focusing on architecture, the Garden District, historic cemeteries, the French Quarter, and recovery from Hurricane Katrina. Come see beautiful architecture, city landmarks, and even spooky cemeteries with local legends attached. Your guide will tell you all the fascinating stories about the history and culture of each area, and discusses the city's experience of and recovery from Hurricane Katrina.



GETTING THERE

Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport (MSY) is just twelve miles from the French Quarter.

Taxicabs: Taxicab booths are located on the first level of the Terminal outside of Baggage Claim Belts 1 and 14. Passengers must wait in line at one of these booths for taxi service. Taxi rides cost \$36.00 from the airport to the Central Business District (CBD) or French Quarter (west of Elysian Fields) for up to two (2) passengers. For three (3) or more passengers, the fare will be \$15.00 per passenger. Taxis are required accept credit card payments. Note: Fares are correct as of January 2019, press time.

Airport Shuttle: Shuttle service is available from the airport to hotels and various other locations in the New Orleans for \$24.00 (per person, one-way) or \$44.00 (per person, round-trip). These fares include three (3) bags per person. Additional baggage may be subject to additional fees. Passengers can purchase tickets at the Airport at Airport Shuttle ticket booths located on the first level throughout the Baggage Claim area.

Mass Transit: Public mass transportation from the airport to downtown New Orleans is easy. The Jefferson Transit Authority (JET) and the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) provide nine (9) daily departures to downtown New Orleans. Both utilize the bus stop located on the outer lanes of the second floor, outside the Concourse C Lobby Information Booth.

The Airport-Downtown Express (E2) Bus operated by JET is \$2.00. The fare boxes will accept \$1, \$5, \$10, \$20 dollar bills and all U.S. coins. The Airport-Downtown Express (E2) provides service from the Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport in Kenner, down Airline Drive into New Orleans, which takes approximately fifty (50) minutes. The Regional Transit Authority (RTA) provides the Airport Express (202) Bus with service to and from the Airport into New Orleans. Pick up locations for the Airport Express (202) Bus in New Orleans can be found at Elk Place at Cleveland and the Union Passenger Terminal Bus Bay 2 with transport to the Departures Level at the Airport Terminal and select trips to the new terminal construction site. The fare for this route is \$1.50. For bus schedule information, pick up locations, and route information, please click [here](#).

Uber and Lyft: Uber and Lyft offer transportation services from the Airport. Passengers can meet their app-based ride service outside of the Ground Transportation Center located on the first floor of the Short-Term Parking Garage by crossing the pedestrian crosswalk located outside of Baggage Claim 6.

GETTING AROUND THE CITY

Whether you get here via car, shuttle or taxi, once you're at the hotel, you probably won't need a car anymore. If you're staying in the French Quarter or Central Business District, there are many restaurants, sights, shops and other attractions that you can get to by walking. If you can't get their by foot, there are bikes you can rent and pedicabs (bicycle-powered cabs).

Buses: No matter where you're staying, New Orleans has a popular, safe and efficient public transportation system to take you to wherever you want to go. The buses can get you from just about any part of the city to another.

Streetcars: You might want to plan your itinerary with activities along the streetcar routes. The New Orleans streetcars are as much a tourist attraction as they are a way to get people around town, so make sure to plan at least an afternoon riding the St. Charles Avenue streetcar uptown or the Canal Street line up to City Park or the Museum. A one way ticket is \$1.25. Make sure you bring cash, because drivers do not take credit cards. There are also 1, 3, 5 and 31 day unlimited riding passes valid on streetcars and RTA buses. 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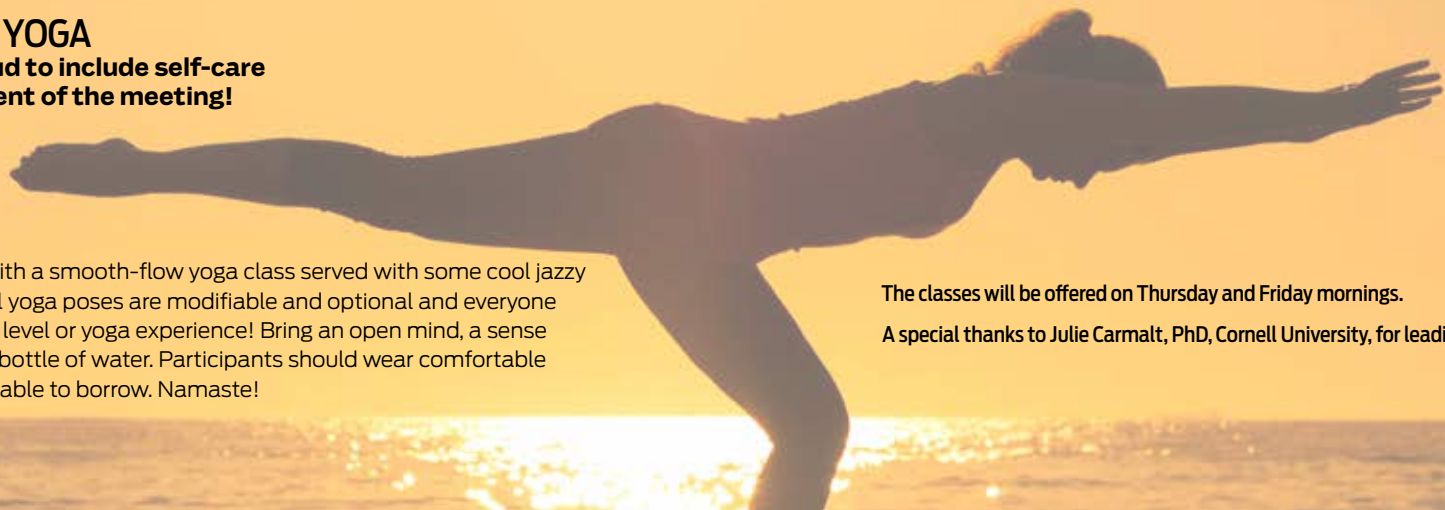
“BIG EASY” MORNING YOGA
