

Position Statement

I attended my first Spring COMMON in 1987 in Reno, NV. Since then, I have attended many COMMON Conferences both as an attendee & speaker in the Americas and Europe. I have a full understanding of the IBM i ecosystem and its unique challenges.

I started my career in 1987 on the System 38 at Advanced Systems Concepts (ASC), an ISV. Innovation was the driving factor for my 17 years there. They were the first company to introduce SQL syntax to the IBM midrange market with SEQUEL, an SQL-based Reporting & Business Intelligence tool. In 1997, ASC developed Y2K tooling to facilitate an automated approach to the field expansion refactoring and DB2 database conversion effort. I was involved with IBM Toronto to bring the first plug-ins to RDi, f/k/a WDSi. My interest and history of promoting the early adoption of new and innovative tooling and processes are well documented in areas like Freeform RPG refactoring, DevOps, hybrid development and version control with GIT.
