HAROLD J. ROSEN was born in New York City in 1915. He attended the City College of New York, graduating with a Bachelor of Chemical Engineering degree in 1938.

From 1941 through 1945 Rosen worked as a Specifications Engineer with the Corps of Engineers. After the war from 1945 through 1956 he worked for the U.S. Veterans Administration, Department of Specifications and Materials Research.

In 1956, Rosen left government service to be Chief of the Specifications Department with Gruzen & Partners, in New York City. In 1964, he became Chief of Specifications for the New York Office of Skidmore, Owings and Merrill. In 1973, Rosen left SOM to open his own practice as an independent specifications consultant.

Rosen is a well know author. He was a contributing editor to Progressive Architecture magazine from 1956 to 1975 where his column "Specifications Clinic" appeared monthly. He is also the author of two books: "Architectural Materials for Construction" and "Principles of Specification Writing."

From 1965 to 1972, Rosen was a member of the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards (NCARB) committee on examinations.

Rosen joined CSI as a member-at-large in May of 1949. He joined the D.C. Metro Chapter when it was formed in 1953. For the New York Metropolitan Chapter, he served as chapter Vice President and editor of the chapter newsletter "The Addendum."

In 1964, Rosen was appointed by CSI to the joint Producers Council-CSI committee that developed the Spec-Data Program. He was concurrently serving as Chairman of the Section Titles Committee and review group that developed the Section titles that eventually were used in the Uniform System in 1965. Rosen was also Chairman of the Section Format Committee that developed the first national format for Technical Sections in 1968.

Rosen was chair of the Technical Program Committee for the 1964 CSI Convention in Dallas.

In 1968, Rosen joined in starting the nationally recognized course in specification writing at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

Rosen passed away on 19 July 2011, at his home in Chevy Chase, MD.
