HENRY BERGH BAUME was born in 1913. He attended the University of Colorado and the New York School of Design. He established his own firm, then worked for Fisher, Fisher & Hubbell, the Denver Planning Commission, and Fisher & Wisher.

In 1953, he was a founder of Baume and Polivnick, Architects, which later became Berne, Baume, Muchow & Polivnick. Baume and Polivnick created the "Holiday Home" design for Denver builder Lou Carey; the design was popular in the 1950s, and is now recognized as a mid-century classic. Baume later served as Director of Planning and Facilities at Denver's Presbyterian Medical Center. After retiring, he remained in business as a private consultant.

Baume was honored by Denver's Building Industry Conference as BIC's first Man of the Year. The award was conferred by Eugene B. Waggoner, National President of the Consulting Engineers Council, at a banquet held in Denver by the Building Industry Conference. Criteria for nominations specified that the achievement award nominees should be directly involved in the building construction industry.

Baume passed away 7 April 1982.
