CHARLES JAMES HUCKLEBERRY was born in 1912. He attended Oklahoma University, where he received a degree in Business Administration.

"Huck" was known as an "apostle of the Institute in the South" where he assisted in founding the first 16 chapters of that region.

Except for interruption for service in the US Army, from 1942 to 1946, with a recall for Korean duty in 1946 to 1948, Huckleberry worked as a sales representative or manager of firms involved in lumber, building products, and toilet compartments. He was president of the Toilet Compartment

Association of Chicago for 1962 to 1964. He was a member of the American Military Engineers, the American Ordnance Association, and the International Order of Hoo-Hoo.

Huckleberry was a member of the CSI Chapter Development Committee.

The Fellows Class of 1966 is notable in that it was the first year that Industry members were allowed to become Fellows. Industry members of the Class of 1966 were Charles Huckleberry, Joseph Lucas, Livingston Atkins, and William Dunne.

Huckleberry passed away on 20 June 1984.
