Charles Jerome Dorman*, FCSI

CHARLES JEROME DORMAN was a native of Washington, DC, born in 1908. He graduated from Eastern High School, attended George Washington University, and graduated from the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC, with a degree in architecture. In the 1930s, he worked for a number of architectural firms and for the Veterans Administration, the Treasury Department, and the War Department.

During World War II Dorman served in the US Army Corps of Engineers. He saw duty in England, France, and Okinawa. After the war he served in a number architectural and engineering posts with the United States government until 1966, when he opened his own firm for the independent practice of architecture, specializing as a cemetery consultant.

Dorman joined CSI in 1958 as a member of the DC Metropolitan Chapter. In 1960, he was elected vice president of the chapter. The following year he was elected to the first of his two terms as president. Following his term as president, Dorman served one year as chapter advisor. The following year he was elected to a two-year term as a director on the Chapter Board.

In 1963, Dorman was elected to a three-year term as Institute Director, representing Region 3.

In 1975, Dorman retired from the practice of architecture.

At the DC Metropolitan Chapter's Silver Anniversary in 1978, Dorman was one of six original recipients of the Chapter's Carl J. Ebert Award.

Dorman passed away on 7 July 1985.
