PHILIP DWORKIN was born in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1930. He was raised on a farm in Freedom, Ohio, until 1934, when his family moved to New York City.

During World War II, he served in the armed forces in North Africa and Italy. After the war, he attended the City College of New York (CCNY) and received a BS degree in 1948. He also attended Columbia University from 1948 to 1950. He became a registered architect in 1962.

Dworkin taught specification writing courses at Pratt Institute as well as at the University of Wisconsin. He was also

involved in the then-emerging field of industrial system building, including a modular construction project in Poughkeepsie, New York.

In 1951, when a small group of at-large members in New York City decided to form a CSI Chapter, Dworkin actively joined the group and became a charter member of the first CSI chapter.

Philip's hobbies included ceramics and skiing. He was a member of the American Institute of Architects.

Dworkin passed away in 1980.
