ROBERT WILLIAM MYERS was born in Minneapolis, MN, in 1921. He graduated from Central High School in Grand Forks, ND and entered the Air Force on December 7, 1939. One year later, he was sent to the Southwest Pacific Theater of operations and wound up spending three years in Australia and New Guinea. After ten years in the service, he contracted polio and was discharged as a Master Sergeant, confined to a wheelchair as a quadriplegic.

Myers continued his education at Arizona State University, and began his professional career as an Arizona Registered Architect in 1972. He began specializing in specifications and became vice president of the architectural firm of Haver, Nunn and Collamer.

Over the years, Myers was active in many community organizations, and was honored by the City of Phoenix's Mayor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped, and Handicapped Code Committee. He is Member Emeritus of

the American Institute of Architects, and served on the AIA Architectural Barriers Committee. Myers is a longtime member of the Paralyzed Veterans of America, and of the Disabled American Veterans.

After joining the CSI Phoenix Chapter, he served as President for two terms, and was Editor of "Cactus Comments" for three terms. He also was Chairman of the Technical, Membership, Education, and Bylaws Committees. He served on the Chapter Board of Directors for 14 years.

Myers received Southwest Region Director Citations in 1981 and 1985. He became a Certified Construction Specifier in 1980. As a professional member he worked on many technical committees for guide specifications. After retiring in 1985, he remained active in chapter affairs for several years.
