TERRY J. STRONG was born 25 December 1932 in Astoria Oregon. He attended the University of Kansas in Lawrence, Kansas, graduating from the College of Architecture in 1956.

He received a BS in Architecture from the University of Kansas in 1957, was licensed to practice architecture in 1963, and became one of the first to become a Certified Construction Specifier in 1979.

Terry served in the Corps of Engineers, US Army Reserve, from 1957 to 1992, commanding the 87th Infantry Regiment at Fort Carson, Colorado, retiring with the rank of Lt. Colonel.

Strong became a member of the Denver Chapter of CSI in 1967, and was a co-founder and Charter Member of the Pikes Peak Chapter in 1969. He was a lifetime member of the Pikes Peak Chapter Board of Directors.

He was a licensed architect, and President of Specifications Consultants, Inc., in Colorado Springs, Colorado. He founded this firm in 1979, and expanded it into a national consulting practice specializing in preparation of specifications for architects, engineers, and manufacturers. He retired in 2002.

He was the recipient of numerous CSI awards.

Strong stated that his proudest achievement in CSI was his authorship of the CSI Code of Ethics.

He also was active in the Boy Scouts of America, a member of the Order of the Arrow, and an Eagle Scout. He spent summers working as a wrangler at the Philmont Scout Ranch in the Sangre de Cristo range of the Rocky Mountains in New Mexico

Strong passed away on 4 August 2018 at his home in Pawleys Island, South Carolina.
