

The Pandemic State of K12 School Planning and Construction

Most school boards and superintendents have seen their bandwidth for action absorbed by the immediate challenges of providing resources to their students this fall. Though nearly all school districts in Washington State face continued capacity needs as well as aging infrastructure and deferred maintenance challenges, most have paused their long term capital planning during the pandemic crisis, or at least slowed their progress so they can focus attention on the immediate crisis. Many have shifted their facilities resources to focus on safe delivery of services during the pandemic, including potential opening of school at partial capacities, food service, busing, and special services like special education, counseling, and academic remediation



As districts turn to their design and construction professionals to help them understand how to navigate their immediate needs, some common key challenges are recurring:

- 1. Community Outreach: While some districts are using technology to hold virtual town halls and community meetings, most are opting to pause long term planning until their communities can gather again.
- 2. Voter Support: most school boards are delaying plans to ask their communities to support a capital construction bond right now. Most fear too much economic instability and uncertainty to get 60% support on a ballot.
- 3. Capacity: Staff is challenged to collaborate with their teams while working from home. Similarly, on site construction is continuing on some work, but carries with it the challenges and delays associated with the extended pandemic safety measures required on construction sites.

One silver lining to the current trend for Districts seems to be that the pandemic has put a pause on the "escalation race" that every school district has been facing for several years. The few districts that have funding in place for future projects, there is the prospect of adding scope and value to their projects. It's a "buyer's market" for school construction right now.



Technically... John Aldredge of LMN on the Origin of Words

Last week I had a discussion with a project manager here at LMN about FRP and how to include it in the drawings. There was a similar product we talked about, a structural plastic. We use a system of abbreviations for Technical Nomenclature or technom for short. FRP is the generally known term for Fiberglass Reinforced Plastic in the profession, except for those who like words it technically should be GFRP.

fiberglas – a patented material developed accidentally by Owens-Illinois (a successor to the

Owens Bottle Co. founded in 1903 that made the first automated bottle-making machine) in 1932 when researcher Games Slayter directed a jet of compressed air at molten glass and produced fibers. Owens partnered with the Corning Glass Co. in 1935 to produce the product in 1936. It was a glass wool with the fibers trapping gas, making it a useful insulator. DuPont developed a resin suitable for combining with the glass fiber in 1936 that replaced the gas, producing a product of great strength.

More accurately the paneling and the structural plastic should be called Glass Fiber Reinforced Plastic (GFRP) or Glass-Reinforced Plastic (GRP) or Fiber-Reinforced Plastic, but glass fiber became known as fiberglass over the years. The fibers may be randomly arranged, flattened into a sheet (called a chopped strand mat), or woven into a fabric. There are various types of glass fiber used in production, identified by the letters A, E, S, C or T https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Fiberglass The structural material mentioned is pultruded FRP, which is drawing resin-coated glass fibers through a heated die – similarly to aluminum extrusion except the material is pulled through the die rather than pushed.

pultrusion - a portmanteau word, combining "pull" and "extrusion". You've seen portmanteau here before: "word blending the sound of two different words" (1882), coined by "Lewis Carroll" (Charles L. Dodgson, 1832-1898) for the sort of words he invented for "Jabberwocky," on notion of "two meanings packed up into one word." Originally it was a traveling case or bag for clothes and other necessaries – French for "traveling bag". Originally it was the court official who carried a prince's mantle.
