Over the years, the quest for a better society has led to the birth of a variety of composite indices of development, from the gross domestic product to the happiness index. These indices usually integrate various social, cultural, psychological, and political aspects and are considered of vital importance for evaluating a country's level of development and for assessing the impact of policy specially in public sector. Overall, they consist of numerical measures that describe the well-being of both the individual and the society as a whole.

The Special Issue of Socio-Economic Planning Sciences encourages original research articles of high quality that provide innovative quantitative and qualitative methodologies based on optimization/non-optimization, statistical learning, econometrics, and heuristics. Topics include but are not limited to:

- Big Mac Index
- Competitiveness Index
- Corruption Perception Index
- Country Risk Index
- Democracy Index
- Doing Business Index
- GINI Index
- Global Entrepreneurship Index
- Global Marketing Index
- Happiness Index
- Human Development Index
- Index of Economic Freedom
- Social Progress Index, and so on.

As such, the Special Issue focuses on the conceptualization and development of new indices for the betterment of the public and/or novel algorithms/approaches that integrate or refine the above indices and/or novel ways of using the existing indices to improve the public policies that serve the greater good. Moreover, this special issue is intended for articles that go beyond purely suggesting a new/modern/revised index with the economics view and conceivably validating it using real life vital data sets; hence, articles that eventually help policy-makers to not only gain an advanced understanding of the ways that would unleash greater long-term social success, but also propose strategies that would create the conditions for the betterment of the public are encouraged.

Contributions from both the academic and the practitioner communities are encouraged. Submitted articles should include a separate section on implications for public policy and, among others, the section should discuss the tie between the proposed indices and the decision strategies in view of public policy.

Editorial Process

Manuscripts need to be submitted via https://www.journals.elsevier.com/socio-economic-planning-sciences by choosing Article Type "Indices". Early submission recommended, referee process starts once the paper received, accepted papers will be published individually online as they are accepted. Submitted papers will be peer-reviewed in the same manner as any other submission to a leading international journal. The major acceptance criterion for a submission is the quality and originality of the contribution.

Operations Research for Health Care: Special issue on "Multi-Criteria Decision Making in Health Care"

Context:

The development and use of new models and concepts to support decision making in health care has constantly increased over the last decades and a variety of techniques has been applied including optimisation, simulation paradigms, and hybrid approaches. In general, quantitative decision support in health care very often needs to consider different criteria to evaluate whether a solution (e.g. a schedule or a network of locations) is good or optimal. In the assessment of solution quality, sometimes different stakeholder's views also need to be captured.

It has been stated in the literature that decision making in health care is, in fact, a multi-criteria decision problem. However, only a few studies do explicitly reflect on this or even critically discuss why a problem is of multi-criteria nature and how it should best be approached. Also, as health care problems address real world issues, the usefulness of such multi-criteria approaches for practitioners and the way solutions are presented and used is of crucial, yet often neglected, importance.

Hence, this special issue aims to collect articles which explicitly address the mentioned issues around multi-criteria decision making in health care. We invite discussions on how multiple criteria are selected, how they are modelled and which approaches can be used to solve the problems. Submissions should also provide insights from the collaborating health practitioners' perspective, e.g. did the model meet their requirements, and what were necessary simplifications, reductions, or extensions to the set of criteria that was used. Contributions should use dedicated

multi-criteria approaches or discuss trade-offs between performance metrics. Finally, we encourage authors to discuss how their solutions have been presented to and used by decision makers.

This special issue "Multi-Criteria Decision Making in Health Care" aims to publish recent advances in the development and use of models and approaches in health care where multiple criteria are explicitly taken into account. We would like to invite both researchers and practitioners who develop and use operations research in health care to submit their work to be published in this special issue.

Possible application areas include, but are not limited to:

- Location problems in health care
- Operating room planning and scheduling
- Physician and staff scheduling or rostering
- Appointment planning
- Emergency department modelling
- Home care and long term care
- Emergency medical service systems
- Health care logistics
- Radiation therapy
- Screening and prevention

We welcome the submission of case studies, in particular when lessons learned from using multi-criteria decision analysis are shared. We invite researchers to submit their work to this special issue as an opportunity for publishing in a high quality journal. Submitted papers should fulfil the scope of Operations Research for Health Care (ORHC) as stated on the journal's homepage (a guide for authors is available here).

Recent special issues related to PSOR

The deadlines have passed for several journal issues that focus on PSOR-related topics, and these issues are briefly described below.

Gerald Midgley of the University of Hull, UK, and Michael Johnson of the University of Massachusetts Boston recently edited a forthcoming special issue of *European Journal of Operational Research* titled "Community Operational Research: Innovations, Internationalization and Agenda-Setting Applications". According to Dr. Michael Johnson, "The issue will serve to define the state of art for community-focused and community-engaged OR that I think embodies the spirit and values of public-sector operations research."

Another special issue of *European Journal of Operational Research*, titled "OR Applied to Humanitarian Operations," is in the editorial process humanitarian logistics, in the editorial process. The guest editors are Luk N. Van Wassenhove of INSEAD, (deadline has ended for submissions) edited by Luk Van Wassenhove of INSEAD, Alfonso Pedraza-Martinez of Indiana University, and Maria Besiou of Kuehne Logistics University. According to the call for papers, "The objective of this special issue is to publish rigorous research that is well-grounded in practical foundation, for example by using real data, assumptions that are convincingly grounded in reality, looking for solutions to specific problems that the humanitarian system is facing, discussing how the results are validated and can be used in the field."

A special issue of *IISE Transactions Focus Issue on Scheduling and Logistics*, with contributions to humanitarian logistics, is in the editorial process. The editors of this issue are Rajan Batta of University at Buffalo, Bahar Yetis Kara of Bilkent University, and Simin Huang of Tsinghua University. According to the call for papers, "The purpose of this special issue is to publish rigorous research around emerging themes in the area of Humanitarian logistics, such as the process of planning, implementing, and controlling the efficient, cost-effective flow and storage of goods, and materials, as well as related information, from point of origin to the point of consumption for the purpose of alleviating the suffering of vulnerable people."
