Transportation Science Goes Online. The editorial board at *Transportation Science* has been making an effort to improve its "web presence". You can take a look at what's been done so far by going to http://www.sor.princeton.edu/~dhb/TS/. So far, most of the changes have been cosmetic, but a number of new initiatives are currently being considered including:

Posting LaTeX/TeX styles and macros that would make it easier to create documents that conform to *Transportation Science* guidelines.

Developing a searchable database of every paper that has appeared in *Transportation Science* (in BibTeX format and plain text).

Creating a code library/repository.

Creating a data library/repository.

Maintaining a database of short biographies (and contact information) of authors that have published in *Transportation Science*.

Maintaining a list of "Dissertations in Progress".
