As the Transportation Science and Logistics Society of INFORMS kicks off a new year, I want to extend a warm welcome to Vice President/President-Elect Grazia Speranza and Secretary/Treasurer Ann Campbell who joined the TSL Board last January. I also want to extend a heartfelt note of appreciation to Patrick Jaillet, Martine Labbé and Ann Campbell who are serving as chairs of our prize committees this year. More than a dozen TSL members, noted in this newsletter, are involved in selecting prize winners, and we are grateful to all for their service on these committees.

As we look ahead into 2013, there are several new initiatives that I want to draw your attention to in this newsletter. The ITS and Aviation SIGs have initiated best presentation awards for the annual meeting, which will be held in Minneapolis on October 6-9. Warren Powell is heading up a committee that will provide recommendations on a new TSL Fellows Award that is being designed to recognize outstanding research and teaching contributions for senior TSL members.

Nick Lownes reports that "We currently have 65 sessions composed of over 250 presentations – many thanks to the SIG chairs and session chairs for organizing a great slate of presentations for Minneapolis."

As we look ahead into fall, I want to call your attention to several opportunities to become more involved in TSL. This fall, we will be electing six TSL officers and appointing the 2014 cluster chair. Elected positions include vice-president/president elect, communications chair, and each of the SIG vice-chair/chair-elect positions. The award is accompanied by \$750 honorarium.

The winner will be notified in October, and the award will be given at the INFORMS Annual Meeting during the TSL business meeting.

TSL Dissertation prize

Reminder !!!!!!!!! Deadline June 30, 2013.

Nominations are invited for this years Dissertation Prize Competition sponsored by the INFORMS Society on Transportation Science & Logistics. This award is the oldest and most prestigious honor for doctoral dissertations in the transportation science and logistics area. The award is accompanied by a \$500 honorarium for the winner. In addition, the winner and the recipient of an honorable mention (if any) each receives an 8x10 plaque announcing the award.

The following criteria will be used in judging candidate dissertations.

- 1 Fundamental contribution and originality of the ideas or methods.
- 2 Practical importance or applicability in solving important real problems.
- 3 Clarity and excellence of the exposition.

Eligible doctoral dissertations are those completed and submitted between June 1, 2012 and May 31, 2013 in the general area of transportation science and logistics.

To be considered, a dissertation must be nominated by the thesis supervisor, who should submit the following items, all electronically in Adobe PDF format:

- 1 A copy of the dissertation (in PDF),
- 2 An extended abstract (3-5 pages), separate from thesis (in PDF or MS Word),
- A letter of nomination from the dissertation supervisor supporting the submission and stating his/her assessment of why the thesis is worthy of the award (in PDF or MS Word), and,
- 4 A completed nomination form: <u>TSL Dissertation Prize Nomination Form</u>

Submissions should be sent electronically to Martine Labbé, Committee Chair, at mlabbe@ulb.ac.be. The deadline for receipt of submissions is June 30, 2013. The recommendations of the judges will be announced at the INFORMS Annual Meeting during the TSL business meeting



Applying Advanced Analytics to Railroad Problems for Fun and Prizes!



Railroad Yard Operational Plan

Participants are asked to build a model which can be used to identify a plan that optimizes the operations of a railroad yard. The goal of an operations plan is to minimize the total waiting time of railcars in the yard and maximize the total number of railcar processed during a certain period. Building a classification yard operations plan is challenging as it covers many interrelated operations and decisions, such as, the sequence of inbound trains' disassembly, the sequence of outbound trains' assembly, sorting plans at the hump, block-to-train assignment plan for classification tracks, etc. Optimizing the operations plan of a classification yard is very important for a railroad company as it helps fully utilize the limited resources of its rail network.

The criteria which will be used to evaluate the solutions proposed the quality of the solution provided, the solution approach used, and the corresponding computational time

Apart from the cash prizes, the first prize winner's contribution will also be considered for publication in Networks. The paper still needs to go through the journal's normal refereeing procedure; however, the paper will receive an expedited refereeing and publication process.

TSL Best Paper Award

The TSL Best Paper Award is given once a year to an outstanding paper in the field of transportation science and logistics. The paper must have been published in a refereed journal and must present innovative approaches for solving complex problems in transportation and/or logistics, with an emphasis on operations research and quantitative methods. A paper is eligible if it is written in English and if it has been published within the three (3) years prior to the submission deadline. All topics related to the field of transportation science and logistics will be considered, including, but not being limited to:

- airline operations;
- facility logistics;
- freight;
- intelligent transportation systems;
- transit;
- urban transportation planning methods;
- vehicle routing.

To submit a paper for the 2013 competition, one of the authors must email the paper, along with a short letter (maximum 2 pages) describing the merits of the paper, to the Chair of the TSL Best Paper Award Committee, by **June 21**, 2013. (PLEASE NOTE EARLY SUBMISSION DATE THIS YEAR / NO EXTENSIONS TO DEADLINE PLANNED.)
