	<ol> <li>Senate Bill 270 – This Bill prohibits a prescriber from prescribing a Schedule 2-5 controlled substance unless the prescriber is in a bona fide prescriber-patient relationship with the patient for whom the controlled substance is being prescribed.</li> <li>Senate Bill 272 – This Bill provides that before prescribing a controlled substance that is an opioid, the prescriber must provide information to the patient and the patient must sign a DHHS form.</li> <li>Senate Bill 273 – This Bill provides that prescribers must provide information on substance use disorder services to patients being treated for opioid-related overdoses.</li> <li>Senate Bill 274 – This Bill prohibits prescribers from prescribing opioids under specified circumstances.</li> <li>House Bill 4404 – This Bill would regulate "pain management facilities."</li> <li>House Bill 4405 – This Bill provides qualified immunity to a pharmacist who refuses to dispense Schedule 2-5 controlled substances if the pharmacist has a reasonable and good-faith belief that the prescription was not written by a prescriber in good faith or is being filled for an illegitimate medical purpose.</li> <li>House Bill 4408 – This Bill mandates parental consent and certain disclosures when prescribing a controlled substance containing an opioid to a minor, subject to certain exceptions.</li> <li>House Bills 4425-4426 – These Bills would amend the Public Health Code and the Revised School Code to ease the process of obtaining a waiver from vaccinations for school children.</li> <li>Senate Bill 86 – This Bill would extend the existing Penal Code statute</li> </ol>
