"No one can do everything, but everyone can do something" Remember MONA is your voice in the Missouri legislation. The dues to MONA support this voice and those that work to have your voice heard. To be a MONA member it costs a new member \$177.75 per year or \$15.31 per month. A renewal membership costs \$214.25 per year or \$18.35 per month. Please try to support those who support not only APRN's but all Missouri Nurses. You can join by going to www.missouinurses.org and registering online.

I represent StLPNP's on the Missouri Council on Advanced Practice (MOCAP). This is an organization of Missouri Advanced Practice Registered Nurses that operates as an organizational unit within the formal structure of the Missouri Nurses Association. It brings together representatives from APRN groups from across the state to nurture, enhance and promote the role of the Advance Practice Registered Nurses. We meet quarterly. Our last meeting was on October 21, 2010.

At our last meeting we reviewed the strategic plan which included legislative barriers, recruitment and retention issues, education of the public and their misconceptions, and review of the barriers to practice. We working toward "full utilization of nurse practitioners" in the state of Missouri. There are many unnecessary barriers which limit our ability to provide care to the patients we serve. I do not think we give ourselves enough credit for the quality of care we provide. I know so many of my dedicated, knowledgeable, and caring colleagues who are restricted in the service they provide due to unnecessary limitations in the Missouri Law. A report issued in October 2010 by the Institute of Medicine state that nurse can play a vital role in helping realize the objectives set forth in the 2010 Affordable Care Act. There are barriers which prevent nurses from being able to respond to a rapidly changing health care setting and an evolving health care system. These barriers need to be overcome to ensure that nurses are well positioned to lead change and advance health. The committee developed four key messages:

- 1) Nurses should practice to the full extent of their education and training.
- 2) Nurses should achieve higher levels of education and training through an improved education system that promotes seamless academic progression.
- 3) Nurses should be full partners, with physicians and other healthcare professionals, in redesigning healthcare in the United States.
- 4) Effective workforce planning and policy making require better data collection and an improved information infrastructure

We invite you to become a founding member of the **Ambulatory Care Research Consortium for Nurses in Advanced Practice in St. Louis (ARCHNAP- St. Louis).** This is one of four nursing practice-based research networks (PBRNs) in the country. PBRNs are groups of primary care providers working together to answer practice-based health care questions and translate research findings into practice.

What are the advantages of joining ARCHNAP-St. Louis?

- You can guide researchers in delineating studies that are relevant to advanced practice nurses.
- You can participate in research projects relevant to your clinical practice.
- You decide whether to participate in each project.
- You will receive results of ARCHNAP studies.

We invite you to participate in our first project whether or not you join ARCHNAP. The initial ARCHNAP project is a survey to identify how APNs manage overweight and obese patients.

You can participate in the project by:

- Completing the Provider Survey on Weight Management. The survey is anonymous and should take ten minutes to complete. We will provide a paper copy of the survey and a postage paid return envelope in which to return it. You don't have to join ARCHNAP to complete this survey.
- 2. Meeting with the Principal Investigators in person or by phone to learn more about ARCHNAP and to join the research network. We will provide a postage paid reply card to indicate your interest in the project and provide contact information.
