#### **Legislative Update**

Welcome to the start of another year with NAPNAP! With elections around the corner, the voice of the nurse practitioner must now be stronger than ever. Plato wrote "One of the penalties for refusing to participate in politics is that you end being governed by your inferiors." Join the voices of your colleagues to make the needs of NPs heard. Only this way can we continue to deliver amazing care to the children and families whom we serve.

The purpose of NAPNAP-LA's Legislative Committee is four-fold: 1) To communicate important information about local and national legislation affecting children' health and NP scope of practice. 2) To evaluate proposed federal, state, and local legislation and advise the Board and Chapter membership.

3) To increase visibility of

legislative matters for members. 4) To research, initiate, or participate in the writing of bills and creation of legislative initiatives or advocacy as appropriate.

I decided for this newsletter to share with you a campaign by the American College of Nurse Practitioners (ANCP), whose mission is "to ensure a solid policy and regulatory foundation that enables Nurse Practitioners to continue providing accessible, high quality healthcare to the nation".

Q: Do you know that there are 125,000 Solutions to the Primary Care Shortage?

A: Yes, Nurse Practitioners

Dear President Obama and Members of Congress:

As leaders in primary and acute healthcare, the 125,000 nurse practitioners (NPs) in the U. S. today are highly qualified to participate in the planning and implementation of healthcare reform programs as they are considered by your administration and must be a vital part of the prescription for increasing access to high-quality healthcare

NPs have been providing primary care in the U. S. for more than 40 years. They are graduates of master's, post-master's or doctoral NP programs, with advanced clinical preparation to provide primary, acute, and chronic care to patients of all ages and walks of life.

A large body of research has established that NPs provide high quality, cost-effective, comprehensive, personalized patient-centered healthcare with excellent outcomes. In addition to diagnosing and managing acute episodic and chronic illness, NPs place a strong emphasis on health promotion and disease prevention. They are skilled clinicians who include teaching and counseling individuals, families and

communities as a major part of their practice.

NPs practice autonomously and collaboratively with healthcare professionals and others to assess, diagnose, treat, and manage the patient's health problems and needs. They serve as healthcare researchers, interdisciplinary consultants and patient advocates.

The American Academy of Nurse Practitioners and the undersigned organizations, on behalf of the 125,000 NPs licensed to practice in the United States, offer our extensive resources to your administration as you work to bring healthcare to all."

In 1965, Loretta Ford, a Public Health Nurse (PHN), recognized the need for greater access to primary care for children and families living in rural Colorado. Together with Henry Silver, M.D., Ford developed a model for the Pediatric Nurse Practitioner (PNP) role, which would allow nurses with additional education and training to focus on well care and prevention for the underserved. Ford's vision was to increase access to health care using PNPs. Today there are over 150,000 NPs providing health care in a variety of settings throughout the United States. Access to quality health care for the uninsured, under-insured and underserved continues to be a challenge in 2012. Forty-seven years after the inception of the Advanced Practice Nursing role, it is more important than ever for NPs to continue to be an integral part of the solution to our national health care crisis. As we practice in our individual settings, we can daily make a difference in the lives of our patients, their families and their communities. Together, as members of the Los Angeles Chapter of the National Association of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners (NAPNAP-LA), we can accomplish so much more. There are many voices in the ongoing debate over health care; NPs must be heard as we work to overcome barriers and increase access to the comprehensive, quality care that we provide.
