This scenic section of the creek winds through a wooded valley dotted with rock beaches. The route features a rock-bottom streambed with gentle riffles, small rapids, and calm pools, and ranges from 35 to 90 feet wide.</p> <p><i>The water is classified as Class I+ and typically takes about two hours if paddled continuously. Depending on water conditions and pacing, the full experience generally lasts 2–3 hours.</i></p> <p><b>What to Bring:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Secure footwear (no flip-flops)</li> <li>• Clothing you don't mind getting wet (quick-drying materials recommended)</li> <li>• Sunscreen, a hat, and glasses straps</li> </ul>
