### **EXAMPLES OF STATE BUDGET ACTIONS IN RESPONSE TO COVID-19**

Contained in this document are examples of budget actions states have considered, proposed or enacted in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and ensuing economic downturn, compiled by the National Association of State Budget Officers (NASBO). This document is intended as a point in time reference and is not a complete list of actions taken or proposed to date. The following information was taken from official and unofficial sources, including governors' websites and media reports. NASBO has not independently verified the accuracy of this information. This listing of actions is not meant to be exhaustive, but rather illustrative of the tools states are turning to in response to this crisis. States' budgetary responses to this crisis are rapidly evolving as more data become available. Most states are still in the planning process for the adjustments necessary to balance their budgets in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, as they are also awaiting more certainty at the federal level regarding aid to states.

Considered: Contingency planning exercises, such as budget instructions to agencies to prepare for budget cuts or discussion of potential need for layoffs

Proposed: Formal proposals by the governor or state legislature

Enacted: Action has been approved by the legislature and/or signed by the governor

Executive Authority: Governor used executive authority to act, such as ordering budget reductions in response to a revenue shortfall
