Emerging Issues High-Need Students

- At-risk

- The majority of states use free/reduced price lunch to identify at-risk students
- Community eligibility districts with high poverty rates can now provide free breakfast and lunch to all students
- This has created Issues with student identification

English Language Learners

• Moving students off of identification



Emerging Issues

High-Need Students

- Special Education

 Funding based on services provided instead of disability groups

Other Student Groups

- Gifted & Talented
- Migrant
- Homeless
- Wraparound services/Community schools

Emerging Issues

- Programs that were underfunded during the recession (Facilities, Transportation, Textbooks and Technology)
- Recruiting & retaining quality teachers
- Some states are looking at moving to a <u>competency based system</u> – which would change the way we think about funding



Every Student Succeeds Act Title I

- Under ESSA starting in December of 2018 districts will need to start accounting for expenditures by school
- Proposed rules would require districts to equalize school level expenditures by 2021
- Districts that do not equalize their spending by 2022 could face a loss of Title I funds

Local Property Taxes And School Funding

- 44.3% of school funding comes from local sources (Ranging from 71% in IL to 15% in ID)
- Somewhere between 80% and 90% of local funding comes from property taxes

Enrollment Options and School Funding Issues

- Who pays the local share?
- What does it mean when districts transfer local revenue?
- Will local voters support tax levies that are transferred outside of their district?



Enrollment Options and School Funding Issues

- What if local school funding revenue did not exist?
- Michigan (1994)
 - The state controls the majority of local revenue
 - Local property taxes are sent to the state and then distributed to districts
 - Districts have very little control over local operating revenue (still have control over facility revenue)
