#### Diabetic Care:

Description: Interactive Case Presentations will be used to illustrate best practices for diabetes technologies such as CGM and AIDs (automated insulin delivery systems) using shared cooperation from the healthcare team (led by school nurse, student/families, and HCP) to improve positive outcomes and reduce the negative consequences of working with diabetes technologies.



Dr. Rodriguez, Pediatric Endocrinologist, USF Professor of Pediatrics, and Clinical Director of the USF Diabetes and Endocrinology Center, has focused on the prevention and improved management of diabetes. In addition to his clincal work, he has been a lead investigator in national and international diabetes studies including the NIH-funded DPT-1, TrialNet, EDIC, and the Helmsley Trust-funded T1D Exchange. His work seeks to preserve insulin production in individuals with type 1 diabetes and expand the number of FDA-approved therapies for children with diabetes. He serves on the American Diabetes Association (ADA) Scientific Oversight, National Advocacy, and Legal Advocacy Committees, and the Safe at School, and Membership Advisory Working Groups. He is also President of the local ADA Community Leadership Board and a long-standing faculty member for the annual Children with Diabetes Friends for Life Conference. His also a longstanding supporter of diabetes camps

and advocate for students with diabetes.



Janet Rodriguez is an experienced nurse, educator, and research coordinator with over one-decade of expertise in diabetes technologies. She has been a diabetes educator and device trainer since 2012. She specializes in diabetes technologies and leads the Diabetes Technology Clinical and Clinical Research Programs at USF. She is a proud member of the American Diabetes Association's (ADA) Safe at School (SAS) Working Group and long-time faculty member for the annual Children with Diabetes Friends for Life Conference and medical staff for Florida Diabetes Camps. In concert with the ADA SAS team, she developed a comprehensive Diabetes Medical Management Plan and supporting educational material that serve as a national resource for school staff caring for children affected by diabetes.
