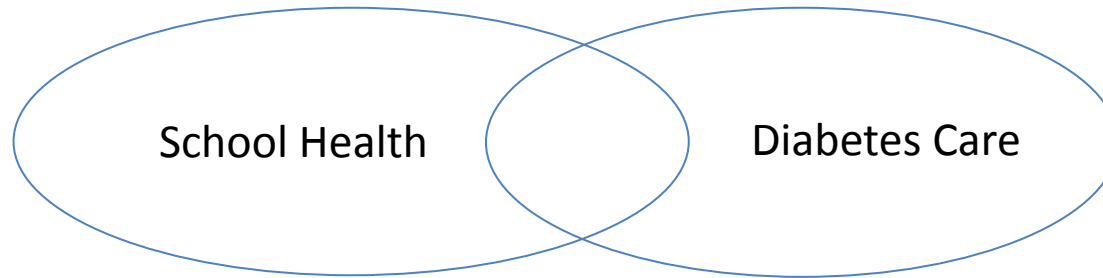

YOUR STATE: Ohio

In Ohio, is a school nurse required in every school/district?

- No

YOUR ST♥TE: OHIO

What credentialing is required to be a school nurse?

Has to have

- RN, Bachelor's Degree,
- Others? Not SNs but health aides, LPN and pupil services license but are not called SNs
- SN Credentialing
- School Nurse License (requires additional education- Bachelor's Degree and additional college courses that allows to apply for license including SN license programs)
- **Nurse Registration** (requires OH RN and Bachelor's Degree)

YOUR STATE: OHIO

How do students get **insulin** when there's no school nurse or licensed health professional present?

- Medication must be prescribed
- School administrator DESIGNATES who can give it
- **Ohio Revised Code 3313.713**
<https://codes.ohio.gov/ohio-revised-code/section-3313.713>
- A licensed health professional provides general training but the administrator is the one designating

YOUR STATE: OHIO

Can a school nurse delegate any medication administration?

- **NO**

- Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) 4723-13-05.
<https://codes.ohio.gov/ohio-administrative-code/rule-4723-13-05>
- Specific exceptions listed in this code include some topicals, some ear/eye drops, some foot soaks.
- **Oral or injectable meds cannot be delegated.**

YOUR STATE: OHIO

School orders

- Challenges with how much wiggle room is in line with Ohio law (need written clinic parameters for parents asking for changes without updated orders)
- Order templates by clinic

GLUCAGON

- Stocking glucagon at public and private schools **IS** supported
 - <https://codes.ohio.gov/ohio-revised-code/section-3313.7115>
 - In the 504 plan it is written that students can self carry and have to work with each student on self-carry and needs to specified in the 504 plan. Field trips self carry in 504 plan needs to be mentioned.
